3. The rental is on area, rather than tonnage, basis. The rate paid is \$200 per acre per annum.

4. The corporate body of the Kanawaki Golf Club holds 8 separate leases on the Caughnawaga Reserve to September 30, 1995.

The Kanawaki Golf Club annually pays \$1,000 into Band funds and a total of \$5,518.44 to individual land owners.

IMMIGRANTS WITH PROFESSIONAL QUALIFICATIONS

Question No. 650-Mr. Rondeau:

1. During the past ten years, how many immigrants with professional qualifications have entered Canada?

2. How many of them have elected to take up permanent residence in Canada?

3. How many have returned to their countries of origin (other than the United States)?

4. How many of them have emigrated to the United States?

Mr. Yves Forest (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council): I am informed by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and the Department of Manpower and Immigration as follows: 1. During the past ten years the number of immigrants with professional qualifications entering Canada is as follows: 1959, 6,947; 1960, 7,436; 1961, 6,696; 1962, 8,218; 1963, 9,640; 1964, 11,965; 1965, 16,654; 1966, 23,637; 1967, 30,853; 1968, 29,250 —Total 151,296.

2. 151,296 (an immigrant, once landed, becomes a permanent resident of Canada).

3 and 4. Permanent residents of Canada are not required to report their whereabouts or movements to the Department, hence the Department does not compile the kind of data required to reply to these questions.

INDIAN AFFAIRS AND NORTHERN DEVELOP-MENT—APPROACH AND ACTION OF CERTAIN PERSONS

Question No. 653-Mr. Howard (Skeena):

Has any attempt been made to identify the person or persons in the employ of the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development who engaged in an approach termed "insidious" by the Crockett Writers Company in its quarterly report for the period ending March 31, 1969 to the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development and which approach involved "Xerox" processing and the distribution of copies of a contract marked "confidential" and, if so, what is the name and position held by each such person?

Questions

Mr. Russell C. Honey (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): 1. Yes, an investigation into Crockett Writers allegations was launched when their report was submitted and appropriate steps were taken to ensure that the firm receive the cooperation it required to perform the duties as outlined in the terms of the contract. Xerox copies of the contract were sent to all regional offices to ensure cooperation with the firm.

INDIAN AFFAIRS AND NORTHERN DEVELOP-MENT—CO-OPERATION IN IMPROVING IMAGE

Question No. 654-Mr. Howard (Skeena):

Has any attempt been made to find the identity of the persons referred to in the Quarterly Report for the period ending March 31, 1969 by Crockett Writers Company to the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development as being "some department heads who will never co-operate with us in trying to improve the image of the Branch" and, if so, what is the name and position held by each such person?

Mr. Russell C. Honey (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): 1. Yes, as mentioned in the reply to Question No. 653 appropriate steps have been taken to ensure that the firm receives the cooperation it requires to fulfil the terms of the contract. It would not, however, be in the public interest to divulge names.

DISCONTINUANCE OF OPERATIONS BY KNITTED OUTERWEAR MANUFACTURERS

Question No. 666-Mr. Salisman:

1. How many manufacturers of knitted outerwear have discontinued knitting operations in the years 1965-66, 1966-67, 1967-68 and 1968-69?

2. How many jobs have been lost as a result of these changes?

Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): 1. The information required is not available from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. However, according to industry sources, the numbers of companies discontinuing operations during the years requested were as follows: 1966, 3; 1967, 5; 1968, 8; 1969, 4 to date.

2. The numbers of jobs lost as a result of these changes were: 1966, 125; 1967, 170; 1968, 520; 1969, 155 in two companies. Information concerning the jobs lost as a result of the closing of the other two companies is not available.
