REGIONAL ECONOMIC EXPANSION

NEW BRUNSWICK AND NEWFOUNDLAND— SPECIAL AREA PROGRAMS

Mr. James A. McGrath (St. John's East): Mr. Speaker, this will give me an opportunity to set the record straight. My point refers to a question I directed to the President of the Treasury Board. It had to do with the approval of two special area programs under regional economic expansion for New Brunswick and Newfoundland. On Wednesday last in the Standing Committee on Regional Development the minister said, in reply to a question, that both of these programs had been approved by the provinces and were being considered by Treasury Board. Yesterday, as recorded at page 5930 of Hansard, I directed a similar question to the Minister of Regional Economic Expansion, and he said in reply to the question regarding these two programs that they were before Treasury Board. The question that I wanted to put to the minister to set the record straight, because of the importance of these two programs, is: When did Treasury Board approve the programs, when was the Minister of Regional Economic Expansion notified, and when were the two provinces notified?

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. With the consent of the House perhaps the minister might reply to the question, but again we are faced with the situation of the Chair having taken it upon himself to give additional time to hon. members, and the hon. member for Qu'Appelle-Moose Mountain, the hon. member for Waterloo and the Minister of National Revenue were among those who were anxiously waiting for an opportunity to get the floor. This is part of the general government approach to reducing unemployment in these areas. In specific response to the hon. member's question, let me say that these two programs were discussed with the Minister of Regional Economic Expansion yesterday at the Treasury Board and approved.

ARCTIC WATERS POLLUTION PREVENTION BILL

PROVISIONS RESPECTING DEPOSIT OF WASTE, PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS OF WORKS, SHIPPING SAFETY CONTROL ZONES, ETC.
