The institution at Pembroke street was thrown open and a cordial welcome given the guests by M.s. Torrington and Mrs. Sullivan Mallon, president of the alumnae. Mrs. Irwin Simpson, the secretary, and Mrs. R. L. Brereton, representing the Philhar-monic Society, were on the receiving committee. The old historic hall in which so many of those assembled had gained knowledge and inspiration was brightened with flags and pennants, and the oil painting of Dr. Torrington. presented him some years ago, in which he is shown baton in hand attracted much attention, as did also the large portrait of the great Philharmonic of 1884 and other interesting souvenirs.

The presence of the leading figures in the musical world of Toronto and the generous character of their testimeny towards their confrere made the event of Saturday night outstanding and unequaled in many respects in the history of Toronto, the speakers without exception giving Dr. Torrington credit for the exceptional things he had accomplised along musical

Preceding the addresses a musical program was given, in which Mrs. Bon-sell Barron, Miss Wedman, J. D. Dickson and A. M. Gorrie took part. Mrs. Scott Raff as mistress of cere-monies made a delightful speech, in which she referred to her own days at the college and the benefit and kindness she and others had been the recipient of at the hands of Dr. Torrington. H. Hewlett, Augustus Bridle, Henry K. Gorden, W. H. J. Carnahan, Irene Gurney Evans and Clarence Lucas, a poetic tribute being read from H. Isabel Graham Graham.

PARTIES REACHED LINES

Enemy Compelled to Flee After Desperate Hand to Hand Fighting.

ROME, via London, Dec. 5 .- The following statement conce ning the progress of hostilities was given out by the Italian War Office Saturday: "There were encounters between de-tachments in the Tonale zone, and we repulsed enemy troops near Sanbar, Tolmino, Hospi'e, and in the Ledro valley where the enemy delivered an attack on our positions north of P.e which we recently captured. "After concentrated artillery pre-parations with guns of all calibres dense masses of infantry, advancing like waves, charged our trenches in the Mrzli redoubt on Monte Nero. Not-withstanding the destructive effect of our accurate and rapid fire, parties of the enemy penetrated our lines in a few places, from which they were driven out after violent hand-to-hand fighting.
