towards the prifoners, notwithstanding two of their own nation had been fo cruelly treated by the provir cials. This feems to be the only alteration he wished to have made in the relation. He reafons justly on the imprudent conduct of the Congress, for the favages finding no faith could be put in them, were with difficulty reftrained, by the humane efforts of Sir Guy Carleton, from committing acts of wanton cruelty, on the innocent and defenceless families, inhabitborders of Lake Champlain; ing the and it is much to be feared, in cafe this painful war should continue another year, and Government be under the necessity of employing the favages, (which must inevitably be the cafe) that the commanders in America, with all their repugnance to fanguinary measures, will not be able to prevent that deftruction, which the Congress have fo wantonly provoked, by proceedings difhonourable to any cause. This fet of reftless and defigning men, from motives of private interest, emulation, and envy, have beguiled the multitude into general animofity, hatred, and revenge against the parent state; they have discarded truth, (the custos virtutum omnium) and cheated the people of their liberties and

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
