O! that His Spirit would so shed abroad His love in our hearts, that, being animated and quickened by the Spirit, we might shew our love of Him by a Christian love of one another. O! that there were more readiness for self-sacrifice, more alacrity of self-devotion, more diligence in self-denial,—that the Gospel were planted, not in our heads, but in our hearts, that so from a consistent and holy walk, the glory of the Lord might be gathered, and the
