For it must not be forgotten that Hall's so-called identifi tion has always been regarded as extremely weak. In this connection we find that the incident as alleged to place between 5.40 and 6 p.m. in a partially lighted passa and that in the passage at that time were at least fourte officers of both county and city force congregated, and t N.-E. Railway police, most of whom were engaged in this ca

and none of whom were in uniform.

Having regard to the inability of Hall and Spink to ident the police officer in question, we do not consider it necessa to collect all the officers who were probably there at the tin (although we have to-day seen seven of the number, and absolutely deny any knowledge of the incidents).
