CLARK COULD BEAT TAFT

With Annexation of Canada as Platform Could Surely Win, He Says.

WINNIEPES, Nov. 2.—Complete figures of the votes cast in the recent Dominion elections for the constituencies in the Province of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, show a total vote in these three provinces of Western Canada of 124,671 for the Liberals, and 102,000 for the Conservatives.

EDMONTON, Nov. 2.—Latest returns confirm Conservative victories in all four seats. The majorities are: Calgary, Tweedie, 1115; Gleichen, Riley, 326; Lethbridge, Stewart, 178; Pincher Creek, Kemmler, 135, with two polls to come.

It will probably be the beginning of next week before N. W. Rowell issues the manifesto to announce his platform as leader of the Ontario Liberals.

The temperance issue is giving the special committee appointed to draw up the Liberal platform, the greatest amount of worry. It cannot be decided just whether it would be better to come out for provincial prohibition or put the responsibility on the hotelkeeper as suggested at the convention by President H. M. Mowat.

The new leader has ordered that no seats are to be taken by Conservatives by acclamation, and every constituency must be contested, as if victory was in sight. Even in Toronto, Mr. Rowell is

hoping to elect a Liberal candidate to the legislature, altho the general feeling here is that the chances of this hope being fulfilled are rather slim.

Alexander McCall, the defeated member for Norfolk in the last Dominion election, has decided to push the protest against the election of W. A. Charlton, the successful Liberal candidate. Mr. McCall states that the protests against the election of David Marshall in East Flamborough and against Frank Lawler in Haldimand, were made at the instigation of Mr. Charlton as a protection against a protest in Norfolk.

Hon. A. G. MacKay, altho no longer leader of the Liberal party, has still the confidence and esteem of his constituents in North York. He has been waited upon by a large deputation of Owen Sound Liberals who urged him to accept the nomination. Mr. MacKay said that he was in the hands of his friends, and there is little doubt that at the convention to be held in Nov. 8, he will be tendered the nomination.

Nominations for the legislature announced date number 83, of which 49 are Conservative candidates, and 26 are Liberals. Altogether there are 108 seats in the local house.

Tanner Again Chosen. HALIFAX, Nov. 2.—The annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Liberal Conservative Association was held today and was very largely attended. One resolution expressed satisfaction with the accession to power of Hon. E. L. Borden, and with the personnel of his cabinet. A resolution felicitating the country on the appointment of the Duke of Connaught was adopted. At a caucus of the provincial opposition in the legislature this morning, C. A. Tanner was chosen as leader. Mr. Tanner formally accepted the office.

Ex-Magistrate on Stump. CHATHAM, Nov. 2.—(Special.)—M. Houston, local police magistrate, deposed by the department, and whose term of office will expire Monday morning, announced to-day that he will stump the riding in the coming provincial election in the interests of the Liberals. He says he has not made a political address since he was first appointed police magistrate twenty-five years ago, when he was an ardent Liberal.

Ward Stanwirth, who has been appointed magistrate pro tem, practiced law for many years in this city, and is well known all over the county.

TO USE WASTE COAL. An illustration of the feasibility of using waste coal for power purposes has just been given in Hull, England, one of the new patent water-tube boilers having been installed in an oil mill in that city. The success of a public exhibition given shows, it is claimed, that much coal which has heretofore been rejected as worthless can be used, and that greater efficiency can be obtained from this waste coal by the new method than from the best coal by the old method.

The system employs the known principle that almost perfect combustion can be obtained by mixing air in proportion with pulverized coal before the latter is introduced into a furnace. This insures better combustion with less air than usual, and with a constant increase of boiler efficiency by reducing the amount of heat carried away by the escaping gases. The re-

sults obtained with the poorest kind of fuel are claimed to be as follows: First—The almost total elimination of losses, as all the fuel is burned in suspension, the amount of unconsumed coal in the furnace at any given time being infinitesimal.

Second—The rapidity with which steam is raised under ordinary conditions. The system differs from others in that with ordinary furnaces some time is taken before the fires are completely alight, but in this case as soon as the boiler is fired theoretically full effect is obtained.

Third—The smallest and cheapest kinds of "black" are burned with ease, and high efficiencies are obtained.

Fourth—The arrangements which permit a close inspection of the straight vertical tubes.

Fifth—The reduction of supervision necessary.

SOUTH CAROLINA'S GIANT EVERGREEN OAKS. Almost as celebrated as the mammoth redwoods of California are the giant evergreen oaks of the lowlands of South Carolina. They not only attain a gigantic size, but they are also long-lived. It is no unusual thing to see a monster tree with a girth of fifty to sixty feet.

The vigor of these trees, says The Technical World Magazine, is all the more remarkable, when one takes into consideration the amount of parasitic growth with which so many of them are laden. Apart from the thick streamers of Spanish moss, which in certain cases out of ten cover the tree like a great gray canopy, there is frequently seen on the same tree dense clusters of mistletoe, often hundreds of pounds in weight.

The early settlers of South Carolina, English, the most of them, with an inherited love and veneration for the sturdy oak, planted great avenues of the noble tree to mark the approach to their new homes. Some of these avenues are still almost intact to this day. The oak too was made use of not only as the means of adorning their homes but as a source of revenue. THE MODEL FOR SHERLOCK HOLMES. Dr. Joseph Bell, the distinguished Scottish surgeon, and the original of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's "Sherlock Holmes," died yesterday at his residence, Mauricewood, Milton Bridge, Midlothian. Sir Arthur Conan Doyle sent a messenger, with sympathy to an Edinburgh evening paper, explaining that he did not know Dr. Bell, recently, but only as the professor, Dr. Bell, who was born in 1815, came from a family which for three generations had been distinguished as the professor, Dr. Bell, of a century he was surgeon at the Royal Infirmary, Edinburgh, and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's "Sherlock Holmes" was one of his students. He was greatly impressed by his professor's display of inductive reasoning, and he told many stories in illustration of them.

Many stories are told of Dr. Bell's wonderful powers of observation and logical reasoning. For instance, he could tell from the mud on a patient's boots the part of the city or surrounding country he had come from. When giving gratuitous advice to outdoor patients at the Edinburgh Royal Infirmary he was fond of mystifying them by giving them little intimate tid-bits regarding their occupation or past lives. I see, he would observe slyly to a patient, "you are suffering from drink. You even carry a flask in the inside breast pocket of your coat. Throw it away." To another he would nonchalantly remark: "Cobbler, I see, having quickly observed the mark where the lapstone had worn the man's trousers. To an anxious mother he would quietly observe: "Your first child, my good woman, the mystified, simple soul wonderingly replied, as he had foreseen, in affirmative. She would go away still marvelling at the intuition of the great surgeon, who had not only observed the significance in the brilliant tartan apron she had bought with such parsimony, but had also observed the mark on the consulting room's suffering from spinal complaint, and the doctor's kindly sympathy was instant and comprehensive. "It aches, does it? I have no doubt it does, and having a heavy load of bricks won't improve it, will it?" he would observe in his brisk fashion. The afflicted bricklayer, being a recent Scot, kept his surprise to himself till the end of the interview, when he asked somewhat caustically, "If a man is a bricklayer to trade?" Dr. Bell was well aware of the part he had played in creating the great detective fiction, and was proud of the fact. One winter evening some ladies were sitting round the fire reading, and discussing Conan Doyle's hero, when there entered the great surgeon. He asked what they were reading, and they told him that it was the "Adventures of Sherlock Holmes."

NEW RADIUM PERPETUAL MOTION MACHINE. The new radium perpetual motion machine of Greinacher, unlike the "radium clock" devised by Strutt seven or eight years ago, does not require operation in a vacuum. It consists essentially of an electrometer, on which is a tube perhaps three feet long, filled with paraffin, at the top of which is embedded a brass plate to intercept the radium rays, a fine wire passing downward thru the tube to a silver wire soldered to a horizontal wire in the e.e.t. meter box. A piece of eum. in an oil covers the brass plate. The radium rays charge the brass plate with negative electricity, which sasses down the copper or platinum wire and charges the cross wire or wire and which is then attracted to the electrometer tubes and is discharged by making contact with a conductor. This is repeated continuously, one in. of each tube every day is placed in the hands of the president of the committee.
