# REDUCE OUTLAY ON TORONTO HARBOR

Prime Minister Urges Need of Strict Economy to Deputation.

## WANT CASH FOR WAR

Members of Government Predict Necessity of Further Cutting Down.

Ottawa, May 9 .- The urgent necessity of avoiding all unnecessary expenditure in war time was urged by the prime minister today in receiving a delegation from the Toronto City Council, the Toconto Board of Trade and the Toronto Harbor Commissioners. The delegation had urged further federal government expenditure on the Toronto harbor improvement scheme to preserve the work already done. In promising full consideration of the delegation's request, Sir Robert said: "It is very difficult indeed for anyone. not in close touch with the administration to realize the position before the country in the matter of finances.
We find people coming to the government as the we possessed an unending source of supply of finances for the purpose of carrying on the war and everything else just as if there were

no war effort required.
"We have done little in this country "We have done little in this country compared with what has been done in some countries. In some countries a nan is not allowed to served a building even with his own money. We have stopped work on the Welland Canal on the Hudson Bay Railway, in Half fax and St. John."
