Ottawa, Ont., April 3.—Formal notice has been given by Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of railways, of a resolution and bill providing for the incorporation of the Canadian National Railway Company. Sir Thomas told the house, in effect, that the negotiations for the purchase of the old Grand Trunk had been reopened, and were now being carried on at Ottawa between the acting premier and President Kelly of the Grand Trunk He more than intimated that in the not distant future, the nationalization of the Grand Trunk and of the Grand Trunk Pacific would be accomplished.
