

COUNCIL PAYS VISIT TO NIAGARA FALLS

Adam's Rivulet Shows City Fathers What White Coal Means. EIGHTY INCHES. Controllers See Jaw Somewhat Wider Than Their Own.

The immensity of the Provincial Hydro Commission's Chippawa development undertaking was made yesterday when members of the city council, Toronto Hydro Commission, and others visited the work now proceeding. To adequately realize the great scheme which Sir Adam Beck and the provincial Hydro embarked upon one has got to traverse the ground and see what is going on, and yesterday enquetes were expressed of the engineers who had thought out a project which promises to be a model of completeness and a success in every way.

In throwing up his hands, Mr. Anderson denounced Sir Adam Beck, whom he alleged was sent or brought to Windsor for the express purpose of defeating the bylaw that would permit the company to operate upon an increased fare. "That a member of the government should be used for such a mission is a shame and disgrace to the province," he said.

Business Agent Thorne informed the board that the men have increased their demands from a minimum of 10 to 50 and from a maximum of 60 to 80 cents per hour, recognition of the union, dismissal of Supt. The company then sped over the various works connected with the Chippawa development and were courteously furnished with information by the Hydro officials. The canal extends four miles above the falls, and will be brought down nine miles to below Queenston Heights, where a fall of over 300 feet will be attained.

It was noticed that excellent progress was being made on the canal work, numerous gangs being employed to carry out the gigantic task. A great part of rock in the parts where work was proceeding had been blasted, and it was estimated that 40 feet further would have to be blasted to reach bed-rock. The canal will be 45 feet wide and the depth by water will be 40 feet.

An interesting section was that near the terminus, where trains had been busy conveying the rock for the stone crusher, which has a jaw 40 inches in width, and after other processes the stone in moderate size is finally deposited in heaps. Sawdust ever rock has been pulverized will not be abegging, but will be utilized in the most suitable fashion. Another noteworthy feature was the fact that the company were above the falls when a visit was made to the Ontario power house and machinery explained which will effectively minimize trouble from ice jams.

ONTARIO R.Y. BOARD ACTS AT WINDSOR

Because Company Fails to Operate Cars A. B. Ingram Is Now Manager. DENOUNCES BECK Vice-President of Railway Co. Says Sir Adam Came to Defeat Bylaw.

Windsor, July 10.—Vice-chairman A. B. Ingram of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, is now manager of the Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg Street Railway Company. His appointment to the office came within 30 minutes of the board meeting here at 10 o'clock today and followed immediately upon a statement made by Vice-President James Anderson that the company, owing to want of proper police protection, was unable to comply with an order issued on Wednesday to operate and maintain an adequate service.

Mr. Anderson's statement was denounced by Sir Adam Beck, who he alleged was sent or brought to Windsor for the express purpose of defeating the bylaw that would permit the company to operate upon an increased fare. WINNIPEG GRANGERS FAVOR OPEN TRADE

Declare Unanimously for Freer Facilities for Trading in Wheat. Winnipeg, July 10.—On Monday last the Hon. A. K. Maclean, citing minister of trade and commerce, issued a statement to the press in effect that at the present time it is not the intention of the government to prohibit or control trading in wheat in the current year, 1919-20, and that in the meantime it is the opinion of the government that open markets should prevail. The members of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange considered the subject matter of this statement at a general meeting today and unanimously declared themselves in favor of the opening of facilities for trading in wheat, and for the organization of all necessary machinery for the purpose of carrying out as far as possible, the regulations as suggested by the acting minister of trade and commerce.

MARINE STRIKE CALLED ON ATLANTIC COAST

Effective Against All Ships Except Those Operated by Shipping Board. New York, July 10.—A strike of marine firemen, oilers and water tenders was called to day along the eastern Atlantic and Mexican Gulf coasts from Galveston, Texas to Portland, Maine. The strikers demand an increase of \$15 a month in wages and a 40-hour week.

OTTAWA DENIES GRANT TO CURRIE

Refutes Story That Canadian General Would Receive Half Million Dollars. Ottawa, July 10.—Statements made at the Vancouver meeting of the Comrades of the Great War, that the government has decided to make a grant of \$500,000 to Sir Arthur Currie are denied by the Canadian military and naval forces. When the estimates were before parliament no such provision was made. Parliament unanimously passed a vote of thanks to Canadian military and naval forces for their work in the war, but, although some suggestion of it was made in the house, there was no vote of a monetary grant.

FRENCH TAX ON PROFITS

Paris, July 10.—The chamber of deputies has unanimously passed a bill imposing a tax of eighty per cent. on all profits realized by owners of buildings from the rentals of the windows and balconies for the victory parade on July 14.

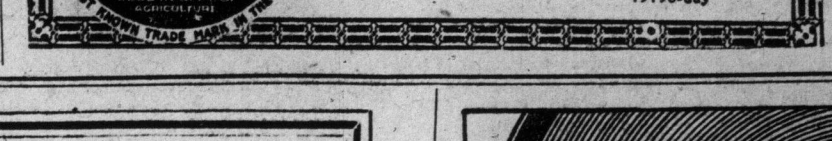
