COUNTY CONSTABLES.

Editor World: Your paper having been so often on the side of the people in introducing new ideas or desirable reforms, I would suggest, that you take up the subject of the appointment of county constables, and advocate some better method than the one now in vogue. As I understand it, these worthies are appointed by the provincial government, and how many of them may be as private individuals, they are about useless as constables. Now there are exceptions of course, but I am speaking of them collectively as I have found them. They are frequently men who, in the prime of life, and therefore handicapped for the class of work they have to do. The positions appear to be looked upon as a soft job, and the appointments seem to be in the nature of a reward for party services. This is in my opinion, the province has got too big for that sort of thing. More efficiency should be shown in the selection of the county constabulary. These constables are not detectives, and the provincial force is limited. It is possible, so that if it is not possible, to chase up promptly all the cases that occur. Would it not be well for the province to appoint their own constables, selecting for the position the very best men in sight, without regard to politics, and to give them a vigorous, efficient men, who know the county well, and with an instruction for, and a fair remuneration, with rewards for good work, and the results are bound to be satisfactory.

Australian Trade Conditions. The conditions of trade through Australia are excellent. The exports of products for the first half of the present year are in the main less than 90 per cent. in excess of the similar period of the previous year. The frozen meat trade has been renewed and is assuming its old proportions. The figures for the first six months of 1906 and 1905 are as follows:

1905 1906. Frozen mutton, carcases . . . 129,957 375,563. Frozen beef, pieces of . . . 8,808 19,902. Frozen rabbits and hares . . . 1,000 1,000. An important item; over four millions were exported during the first six months of this year, of which more than one-half were shipped in June. In addition to those frozen, there was shipped nearly 150 tons of skins per month. This industry is giving profitable work to many who have complained of being unemployed. The prices of the exports have increased in a greater ratio than the value of the goods.

The customs returns of New South Wales for the first six months of the year show an increase of 145,078, being an increase of only 10 per cent. The exports are, therefore, increasing very much more rapidly than the imports.
