Wood, president of the Canadian Stock & Grain Co., the man who is now under bonds awaiting trial on two charges of running a bucket-shop in Winnipeg, and one of the theft of \$1000 margin put up by J. Carrick of Fort Wilmam in a stock deal with the com-pany, will not come before the higher

ourt for trial.

Wood's experience with British law, extending over a period of nearly three months, has apparently convinced him that Western Canada is no place in which to repeat his operations, which proved so profitable to himself and his ociates in the twin cities and other northwestlern American towns. Incidentally the action for criminal libel, brought by Wood against a Winnipeg daily paper, which undertook to criticize his methods, will also terminate. After a long conference with the crown authorities on Saturday, Wood inally agreed to settle all outstanding claims against the company. Wood will deposit with the Astorney-General for Manitoba as trustee \$20,000, also to pay all the costs of the prose-cution. This means that the career of George W.
