Little Rock, Ark., Aug. 25.—If the report which reached here to-day should be true, a wholesale lynching, which, for the number of men put to death without process of law, has probably never been paralleled in the annals of crime, has taken place in Cleburne County, where, according to the report, six men were swung into eternity last night by a maddened and enraged mob of citizens of that county. One negro, guilty of criminal assault, was burned in his own home by a posse of deputy sheriffs in Drew County Sunday night and Tuesday morning the lifeless body of a negro murderer was found dangling from a railroad trestle near Pine Bluff. Last night six of the murderer's companions were taken to jail at Rison, and to-day comes the report that the entire kalf-dozen were lynched last night. All efforts to verify this report have so far proved futile, but there are reasons to believe that it is true.
