A CAPTAIN HERE IN '64.

What Toronto Was When the English Redcoats Were Here—A Pen Picture.

"That is where our quarters used to be," remarked a keen-eyed, soldierly-looking man to a World reporter, as he pointed last night to the old red brick building just east of the Grand Union Hotel, known as the Palace.

The speaker was Capt. E. W. Manning of Cambridge, Eng., late captain of the 47th North Lancashire, and now, after an absence of some years, a guest at the Grand Union Hotel.

Here in 1864. "My regiment was stationed here in 1864," replied Capt. Manning, when asked to go into old-day history. "Col. Lowry was in command, and Major Villiers was second. I don't know what has become of either of these two officers, but I met and John Poirer, then Lieutenant, in Jersey the other day, and Lieut. Dawson, one of our staff, I remember, sold out and started the Bodega, which was afterwards bought by Lord and was then moved to Halifax, and afterwards returned to England."
