## AT OSGOODE HALL

**Mrs. Collins of New York Appeals to Upret Judge Meredith's Decision in Hammitt Estate.**

Mrs. Bridget Collins of New York has filed an appeal to the Court of Appeal from the judgment of Mr. Justice Meredith, delivered at the trial at London last January, dismissing her action against Rev. E. B. Kilroy and Daniel O'Connor of Stratford. She sued the latter as executors of the will of the late Mrs. Johanna Hammitt, her sister, alleging that they had procured the disposition by the deceased of the bulk of her estate to educational and charitable uses in Stratford by undue influence and asked that the court should upset the will and declare that the deceased had died testate and leaving her share of the estate under such intestacy. Mr. Justice Meredith, however, upheld the will, which was worth approximately \$50,000.

**Divisional Court Appeals.**

Chief Justice Meredith and Justices Rose and MacMahon, forming a Divisional Court, yesterday handed out their written decisions in the matter of the following appeals:

**Wooliver v. County Council of Kent.** Order discharging mandamus granted by Mr. Justice Meredith in the case of Wooliver and others requiring the County Council to appoint arbitrators to hear an appeal against the boundaries of school sections 9, 12 and 17 of the Township of Chatham.

**Ferguson v. Galt Public School Board.** Appeal of the plaintiff allowed and a new trial of the action directed with costs to the plaintiff. In this case Chancellor Boyd, at the trial at Guelph last December, dismissed the plaintiff's action for damages for personal injuries sustained on the ground that no case had been made out to the jury.

**Evans v. Valentin.** Appeal of the plaintiff allowed and a new trial directed, with costs to plaintiff. The County Judge of Peterborough had dismissed the action, and was for damages occasioned by the breach of a contract for the sale of property.

**Miss Hunter Gets \$200.**

Mr. Justice Falconbridge handed out judgment yesterday awarding Miss C. J. Hunter \$200 in her action against F. M. Purdy, accountant, of Toronto, brought by her to recover certain moneys paid by her for the purchase of Ontario Bank stock.

**The Free Ferry.**

Mr. Justice Ferguson heard the argument of counsel in the action of Barton against the city over the question of the locality of the payment of money to secure the running of the free ferry last summer.

**Compulsory Vaccination.**

A few medical men, very few, indeed, hold the idea that vaccination is injurious and has resulted to the physical injury of the subject. In some instances this may have been true in the past, but at the present time the great mass of the medical profession cut and approved the efficacy of the greatest good to the community at large by compulsory vaccination. The opinion of the entire ethical medical profession, with few exceptions should be a sufficient guide to the people of this city. His Worship, for "his credit's sake," should lend his influence and encourage the vaccination of "the kids," lest the plague be introduced and the fair face of young Canada be marred and disfigured by the ravages of the smallpox. As to this latter subject all old Irishwomen looking at a man who was occupying a prominent place among his fellows, evidenced a feeling of sympathy expressed by a passer-by relative to the way "the man's face was 'fitted'" by the ravages of the smallpox. She remarked, "Arrah, darlint, curvet your face the dearest."

**Bert Wilson and Edward Mead, Victims of a Fend.**

Bolivar, N.Y., March 1.—A double tragedy occurred here this morning. At about 9 o'clock Ira G. Voorhes entered the carriage shop of Wilson and Mead, where he found the body of Bert Wilson, a member of the firm, lying in a pool of blood. In the left ear and Mead in the right temple. W. A. Mead, father of Edward Mead, said that two men quarreled yesterday, and it is believed the quarrel was resumed this morning. The affair has caused a great sensation.

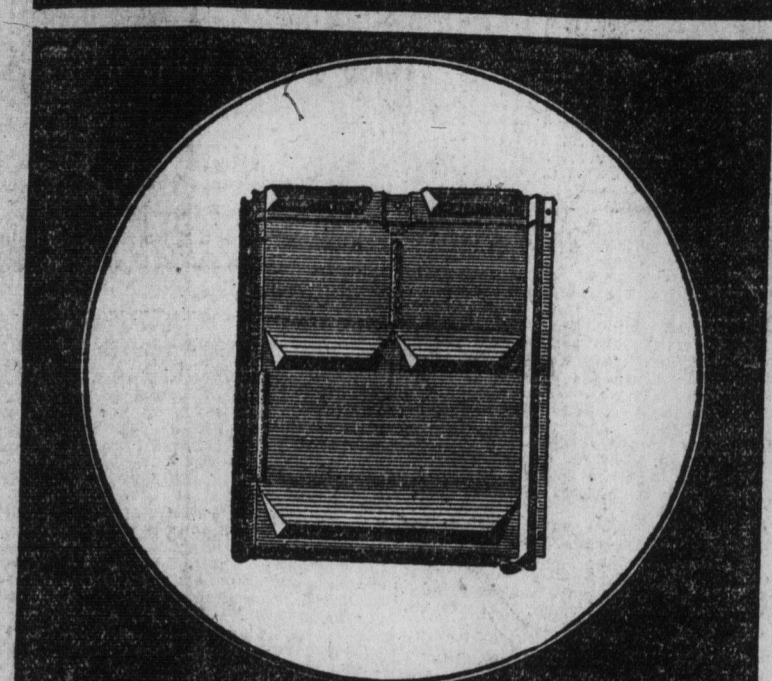
