

A Ship Goes Down and Many Lives Are Lost.

All on Board.

San Diego, Cal., Dec. 24 .- A terrific storm occurred in the Gulf of Cam-peche on the 11th and 12th of this month, and among other casualties reported is the wreck of the bark Jamaica, with twelve passengers and most of the crew lost. The Jamaica was bound from Campeche to Vera Cruz, and had a valuable cargo and some treasure aboard.

The passengers took to the boats, which were repeatedly swamped. Most of the crew simply put on life preservers and jumped into the sea. The captain was one of these. He strapped 100 Mexican dollars upon himself, and clinging to a barrel, tried to reach shore. The survivors saw him sink, owing to the weight of the metal. The sight was a terrible one, as one passenger after another sank, the boats proving unmanageable. The crew were all drowned, and only
