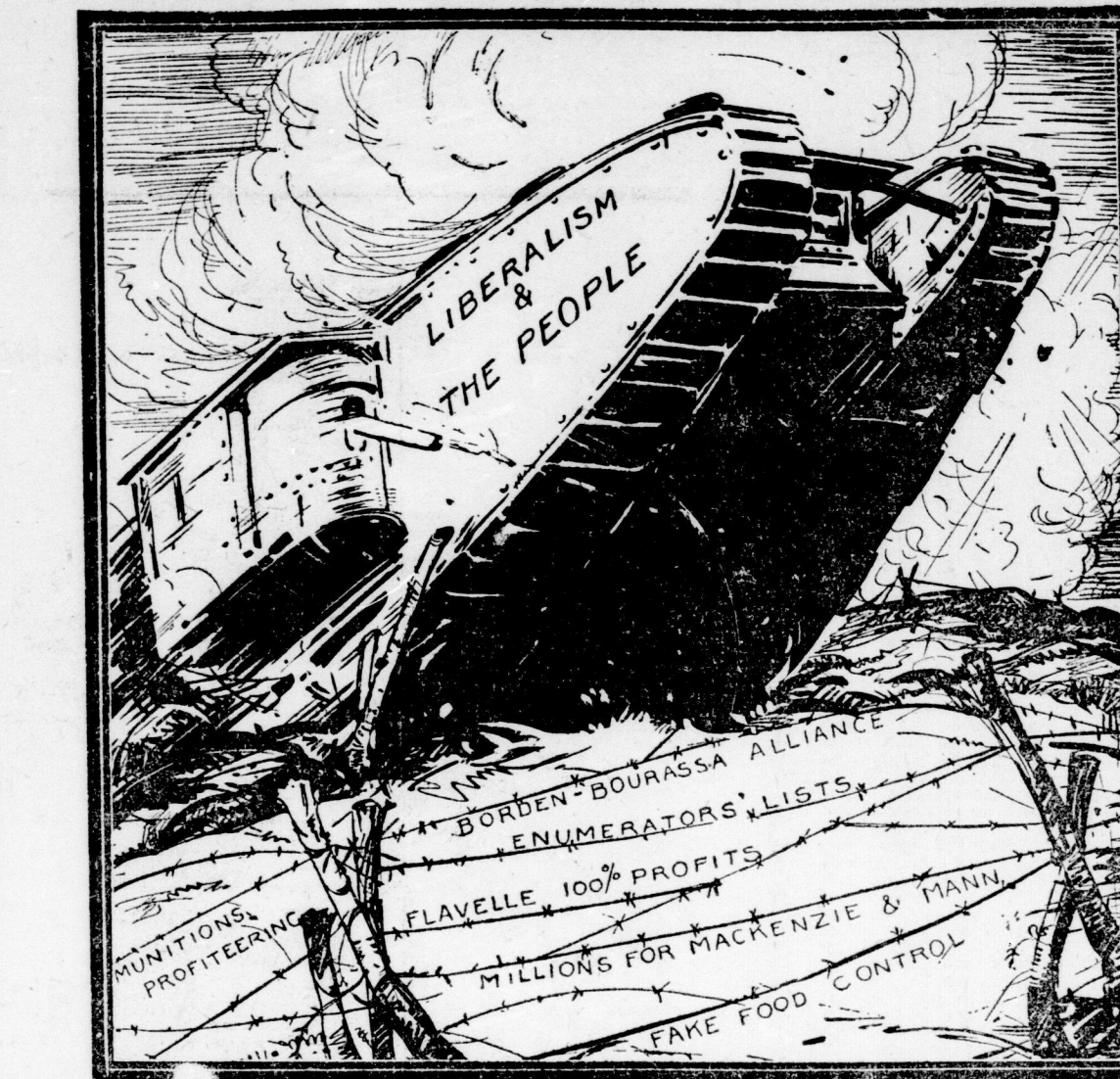

ANOTHER RUSH FAILS TO SHAKE BULLDOG'S GRIP

Terrific Assaults Made Monday by Bavarian Crown Prince.

GEN. BYNG'S LINES FIRM

Sacrifice Made by Germany Ranks Struggle With That of Verdun.

LONDON, Dec. 3.—"From Gonnelleu to the Ypres battlefield, the enemy delivered attacks in great strength with large forces, and has been repulsed with heavy losses. The enemy resumed the offensive on the Cambrai battlefield with great violence," says the statement. "Fighting in an exceptionally severe nature has taken place today. Our positions have been maintained everywhere except at La Vacquerie and east of Maroing, where our line has been slightly withdrawn."

South of Maroing the enemy broke through at one point, but the situation was restored by an immediate counter-attack. In the Ypres battlefield there was local fighting southeast of Polygon wood. As a result we advanced our lines slightly. In a minor operation yesterday north of Passchendaele we took 123 prisoners and a few machine guns.

BRITISH REINFORCED

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE, Dec. 3.—(By the Associated Press).—Employing great forces of infantry and supporting weapons, the Germans today made a second attempt to break through the British defences in the Gonnelleu sector. The British, strongly reinforced, were meeting the onslaught with a series of counter-attacks, according to reports at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The enemy was repulsed with heavy losses. In the Cambrai sector, the Germans succeeded in penetrating the British line, but were immediately ejected. In the course of the day the attack was repulsed with heavy losses; it was of a terrific ferocity.

A SECOND VERDUN.

LONDON, Dec. 3.—According to military writers at the front, the Germans are suffering from a second "Verdun," now raging on the Cambrai salient. Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria, it is said, has been ordered to lead the attack, which is being carried out with reckless waste of lives. Each day's fighting renders Byng's forces more and more exhausted.

In the region of Gonnelleu, La Vacquerie and southward to Vendhuile and Maroing, the British have been successful in breaking the British front. At La Vacquerie they again succeeded in penetrating the village, from which they were ejected previously, but a strong counter-attack again turned the scales in favor of General Byng's forces, who threw out the enemy.

MASSACRE OF ARTILLERY

As in their previous attacks the Germans used great masses of artillery, the British forces everywhere repulsed their onslaughts and last accounts showed them firmly holding their line. Although the Germans in their offensive have been using men reckoned at twenty divisions the British have been able here and there to regain some of the ground they lost in the initial attack, which was delivered with a suddenness similar to that of Byng's big drive toward Cambrai. Sunday night they had gained the eastern end of the village of Villers Gisors and driven out the Germans from La Vacquerie. They held this latter position until Monday morning, when they were compelled again to cede it to the enemy, only to take it again later in the day. Southwest of Bourlon village, to the west of Cambrai, they also have regained lost territory.

CLAIM 6,000 PRISONERS.

The German war office asserts that six thousand British have been made prisoners during their drive, and that one hundred guns have been taken from the British. A large number of the guns already have been recaptured. The four days' battle is described as the most sanguinary one that has taken place since the days of Verdun and the first battle of Ypres.

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RUSS LONDON AGENTS REPUDIATE ALL ACTS OF BOLSHIEVIKI GOVT.

Publishing of Secret Treaties Puts Lenine Outside Pale.

LONDON, Dec. 3.—The British Government has received from the Russian charge d'affaires a formal statement defining the attitude of the embassy and all the Russian agents in London, and repudiating all acts of the Bolsheviki government. The statement is to the effect that the Bolsheviki hold no mandate for the nation, do not represent Russia and are not to be considered as a republican government.

Without taking into account their previous actions, the statement continues, their latest act in publishing secret treaties without the consent of the Russian government is a gross violation of the principles of international law. In these circumstances, the officials have refused to recognize this group of persons and will not accept any orders from them or from any individual acting under their authority or in their name, and, moreover, will not enter into communication with them.

The Russian representatives, however, it is added, deem it their duty to carry on the work entrusted to them by the provisional government in the name of the Russian and the Allies until such time as a government duly elected by the Russian people shall be formed.

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EIGHTEEN ARE GUILTY OVER BRIBERY CHARGES IN COUNCIL OF HULL

Ottawa, Dec. 4.—The long awaited report of Judge McDougall in connection with the recent aldermanic bribery investigation with regard to the liquor question, was presented at the Hull city council meeting last night.

In his report Judge McDougall found eighteen persons guilty of being mixed up in the bribery case. He found four of the aldermen, seven hoteliers and seven residents of the city, who were named in the report as having been guilty of the bribery charges, guilty of the charges.

The report also found that the city, through the medium of a petition by a number of ratepayers had asked for a investigation of the matter, and that it would have recourse to recover the costs of the inquiry, but that the city council had refused to do so.

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LAURIER IN WAR THE FINISH UNTRAMMELED BY BASE ALLIANCES

Wants Canada To Do Her Duty in War, But Coercion Is Not the Way.

SURE HE CAN FILL RANKS

If Govt. Wants to Make Conscription Supreme Issue He Will Meet It.

Borden Is Making Use of Bourassa and Lavergne to Divide Nation.

ARNPRIOR, Dec. 3.—A crowded hall welcomed Sir Wilfrid Laurier in South Renfrew this afternoon, and the Liberal leader was greeted with wild enthusiasm. He drew a salvo of applause when he repeated his emphatic denunciation of Bourassa and repudiated the attempts his opponents were making to fasten the Nationalists upon him.

"As to Lord Lavergne," Sir Wilfrid declared, "he is a candidate in Montreal for the Nationalist election. I have made no alliance with anyone. I stand on the record of my convictions."

He changed his mind. Sir Wilfrid commented, "I did not change mine."

Objective Was Passed Second Time by Over \$75,000.

INGERSOLL, Dec. 3.—A bond in practically every home is Ingersoll's record in connection with the Victory War Loan campaign. Not only did the town surpass its objective, but it established a record that compares with the record of any other town in the country. This is in excess of the first objective of \$75,000. When Ingersoll first aimed at \$300,000, there was a feeling in some quarters that the mark was too high, but when it was raised to \$500,000, it looked well nigh impossible to those unacquainted with conditions. WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The case of Count James Minotto, son-in-law of Lord Dufferin, charged with espionage of being an alien enemy, was ordered reopened today by the department of justice, and was referred back to Chicago for the taking of additional testimony. The department has received a result of evidence brought to the attention of the bureau by "other department" of the Government, the nature of which was not disclosed.
