next day or two, the Anglo-French drive will have to slow down and stop, because the Allies will presently find themselves thrusting into a salient as

awkward as the one from which the German has just been evicted.

No Salient at Present.

As it now stands, there is no salient, or practically none, and the Allied front runs fairly straight from the Oise below. runs fairly straight from the Oise below Ribeccurt to the Ancre at Albert, with the Germans still holding Roye and the British in Chaulnes. At the northern end of this front the German resistance has so far been obstinate, and, on the whole, successful, the Allied advance having been inconsiderable, although it is approaching Bray. At the southern end about Ribeccurt and Lassigny there has been practically no progress so far. progress so far.

We are seeing once more reproduced the normal history of a successful of-fensive in the present form of warfare. Of the four stages, two, preparation of the attack and the attack itself, are the attack and the attack itself, are over. The third phase, that of pursuit, is still going forward, but the successful resistance of the flanks suggests that we are almost at the point where the pursuit will merge into the fourth and last stage, which is the march of approach to the new positions. All now depends upon the success of the Germans in maintaining their flanks in the next 24 hours.

How Germans Got Into Pocket.

To illustrate by example: When von Huitir broke Gough's front 20 miles eastward of the present battlefield on March 21 of this year he put some fourteen British corps practically out of the battle, and opened a gap between the British and French armies, just as Rawlinson has now opened a gap between the armies of the two crown princes, which met between the Oise and the Somme. Following this break, von Huitir's forces rushed in How Germans Got Into Pocket. break, von Huitir's forces rushed in pursuit all the way to the Avre and the Ancre. It was impossible for the Germans after March 28 to advance further, because they were being subjected to flank and cross fire from the unbroken flanks of the two Allied armies.
