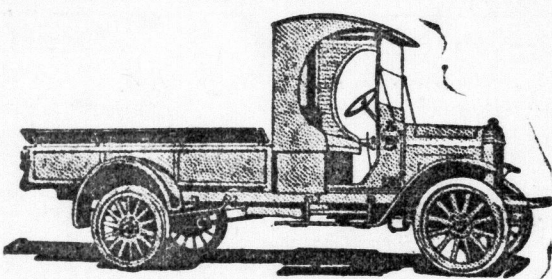

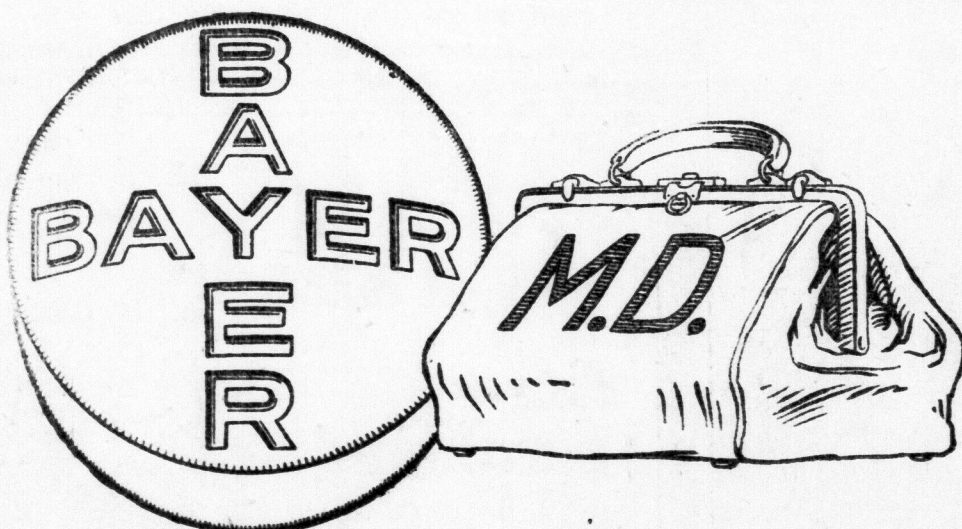

INQUEST INTO DEATH OF BABE OPENED AT DRAYTON YESTERDAY

Inquiry Adjourned Till Monday
—Preliminary Hearing of
Accused Wednesday.

GUELPH, May 28.—In connection with the finding of the body of an infant child in a well on a farm in Maryborough Township, and the charge of murder preferred against Col. Lochan and Mrs. Nellie Beisel, well-known residents of that township, Coroner Dr. H. H. Orton visited Drayton today and completed preliminary details for the adjourned inquest which will be held at Drayton next Monday.

The following jury was empanelled: G. H. Aude, Foreman; P. H. Bramhall, J. Johnston, T. Simmons, C. E. Smith, J. M. Amy, E. C. Andrews, J. C. Heskey, J. Fairweather, all of Drayton. The jury viewed the remains of the infant and immediately adjourned until Monday at 3 o'clock.

BURN POLICE BARRACKS.

DUBLIN, May 28.—The police barracks at Kilmallock, 19 miles south of Limerick, were destroyed by fire last night, after an attack of armed men. It is reported two policemen were burned to death and one civilian wounded.

NEW LIBRARIES' ACT SPASSED BY LEGISLATURE

Designed to Give Stimulus to
Library Movement in Rural
Districts.

MORE ADEQUATE SUPPORT

Will Place Upkeep Costs On
Per Capita Basis Instead
of Mill Rate.

[Special To The Advertiser.]
TORONTO, May 28.—The Legislature this afternoon passed the new public libraries act, which is designed to give places in the rural districts and smaller towns in Ontario and also to provide for more adequate support for the libraries of the province generally. The basis of the support of the libraries will be on a per capita basis instead of the old fraction of a mill rate. The whole act has been revised and brought into line with the new developments of library work. It is the opinion of the minister, Hon. R. H. Grant, that no better libraries act can be found anywhere than that which is now in force in Ontario.

The library rate in municipalities will hereafter be on an entirely new principle. The past library boards in cities with a population of 100,000 or over were entitled to ask up to a quarter mill of taxation, while those in cities of under 100,000 population could ask up to a half mill. This was found unsatisfactory in many respects. The assessment in places having the same population varied as much as 100 per cent, while the variation between small and large places was as much as 600 per cent. Others very poor support. In future the library rate will be on the basis of population, 50 cents per capita, and any city or town with a majority vote may increase this to 75 cents per capita for special need. Thus, in a city of 40,000 population the public library board will be entitled to ask up to \$20,000 as their share of the taxation.

This will apply to every place in Ontario, from the small hamlet to the city of Toronto, but its greatest benefit will be in the smaller places, which in the past have been badly hampered. The act is designed to give an impetus to the free library movement in the rural districts and in the small places where there has been much need. It is provided that a school section may go on with a free public library if it so desire, and it is anticipated that with the coming into effect of the new act there will be a marked growth in the number of free libraries in the rural districts of Ontario. The act is largely by statute.

Hon. R. H. Grant, the minister of education, who has been warmly supporting the measure, which is commended by the leading educational authorities of the province, is likely to bring good results, in the rural field particularly.

U. F. O. MEMBER RAPS MORRISON OVER CIRCULAR

Defends the Government On
Superannuation — Says
Letter Distinctly
Harmful.

TORONTO, May 28.—R. M. Warren, U.F.O. M.P. (North, Renfrew), has written to Secretary J. J. Macdonald of the U. F. O., defending the action of the Ontario Government and the U. F. O. members in supporting the civil servants' superannuation bill and justifying the "round robin" requesting increased indemnity. Mr. Warren criticizes Secretary Morrison on the latter's famous circular to the U. F. O. clubs throughout the province, stirring up the United Farmers against the Government and U. F. O. members of the Legislature on these two questions, and declares that Mr. Morrison's circular will do distinct harm to the United Farmers of Ontario, because it has started suspicions amongst the people in the country and lessened their confidence in their representatives.

NEW ARMORIES ARE NEEDED BY ELGIN REGIMENT, IS CLAIM

ST. THOMAS, May 28.—Local officers and men interested in the revival of the 25th Elgin Regiment will make an appeal to Brig-Gen. H. A. Panet, G.O.C., M.D., No. 1, when he visits this city, asking that more central training quarters than the present armories be secured for the accommodation of the regiment, otherwise they see little chance of success in the work of recruiting the regiment to strength.

The present armories have been found by practical experience to be inconveniently located and beyond a reasonable distance from the homes of the men. So much so that prior to the war and during the war years were provided up town, a provision which moved a great boon to the men, and doubtless aided materially in the big success attained by the city and county in the provision of quotas to nearly every Western Ontario unit.

At that time a site had been secured near to Talbot street for new armories which the then minister of militia, Sir Sam Hughes, had promised to aid in constructing. The city is at the present time seeking for a suitable market site, and it is thought might be induced to purchase the present armory site.

MEDICAL ASSOCIATION PICKS NIAGARA FALLS

TORONTO, May 28.—Clinics at the Toronto General Hospital and the Hospital for Sick Children this afternoon concluded the 40th annual meeting of the Medical Association here. The 500 delegates to the annual meeting were entertained at lunch by the board of trustees of the Toronto General Hospital.

PURCHASE BUSINESS BLOCK.

GALT, May 28.—Longo Bros., wholesale fruit merchants of Kitchener, have purchased the main street block, No. 90 to No. 102, owned by M. Kaufman, for a price reported to be in the neighborhood of \$25,000. There are five stores in the block.

MANAGER OF QUARRY CRUSHED TO DEATH BY TILTING CRADLE

John Bonis, St. Marys, Killed
Instantly; His Head
Crushed.

ST. MARYS, May 28.—John Bonis, manager of the Thames Stone Quarry Company, Water street south, was instantly killed at the quarry shortly after 10 o'clock this morning.

Mr. Bonis was adjusting the friction gear of the tilting cradle, which holds the stone car when it reaches the top of the quarry preparatory to its load of stone being dumped into the stone crusher. The operator of the tilting cradle, not knowing of Mr. Bonis being nearby, tilted the car of stone, with the result that Mr. Bonis' head was caught between two braces and crushed, death being instantaneous. Deceased was in his 51st year. He is survived by his wife and three daughters. The funeral will be held on Sunday at St. Marys Cemetery.

FEW STRIKERS RETURN.

New Bedford, Mass., May 28.—Few strikers returned to the cotton cloth mills here today as a result of the vote taken last night to end the walkout, which has been in effect in eight days for the past four weeks. It is expected that most of the operatives will delay their return until next Tuesday, when a 15 per cent wage increase, recently announced by the manufacturers, becomes effective.
