
Deaths in the City. Deaths registered at the city hall yesterday were: Margaret Bayley, still-born; William Clayton, 18 days, bronchopneumonia.

HAMILTON MOVES FIRST TO PROTECT CHILDREN

Fire Escapes to Be Put on Schools - Fire Drill to Be Perfected - General News.

HAMILTON, March 5.—(Special).—As a result of the Cleveland school disaster, the board of education committee decided to take action this evening to improve the equipment of the public schools.

Drill instructor Higgins was also instructed to take charge of the fire drill and make it uniform in all schools. Six girls will also be installed at all schools of more than two stories, and the building committee decided to ask for senders at once for fire escapes for the Cannon, Hess and Victoria-avenue schools.

City Engineer Barrow has decided to hand in his resignation, and there will probably be a lively fight in the city council Monday evening, when it will be considered.

Schools Without Fire Escapes. Chief Ten Eyck says that none of the public or separate schools are equipped with fire escapes.

TORONTO MAN IN DEBT. Three Million Dollar Limit Bought in British Columbia.

YANCOUVER, B.C., March 5.—(Special).—By the payment of a quarter of a million dollars within the past week a three million dollar saw mill and timber limit deal has been completed.

EDUCATION ESTIMATES WOULD LARGE SUMS

\$60,000 for Enlargement of Harbord Collegiate Institute to Be Asked.

All the estimates which the board of control will be asked to finance were passed by the board of education last night, to the amount of \$1,461,004. It became necessary to add \$100 to the annual school estimates account and \$100 for high school certificates, which had been overlooked.

The total maintenance of the technical high school is figured at \$44,782, less \$3872, for students' fees, leaving \$40,910 to be provided by the city. For colleges and high schools \$113,829 is required, less \$24,297, government grant, leaving \$89,532. Public school maintenance, \$850,000, additional high school accommodation \$145,000; new buildings, additions and new sites, public schools, \$271,475.

As a step towards arriving at an equitable and fair scale of salaries for teachers of all departments, Dr. Hunt moved that the secretary write to eight Canadian cities and secure the schedules of salaries paid for the years 1904, 1904 and 1905.

The inspectors will be asked to report upon what professional, physical, religious and efficiency standards, teachers are recommended for appointment to the staff.

Mr. Houston gave notice of motion to the effect that first classes in the public schools be enlarged to include the same commercial course as employed in the technical schools, to be made optional with the pupil.

The statement that a new election of directors of the Ontario Horse Breeders' Association will be held owing to the irregularities in the last annual election on Feb. 14 last, was made at the meeting of the Canadian Pony Society last night.

There has been much dissatisfaction among the members of this latter organization and also in the Standardbred Association and Thoroughbred Society, because of the irregularities which were ineligible to vote under the provision whereby only breeders or importers were declared to be so qualified.

REFORESTATION REQUIRED. If the Rivers of Ontario Are to Be Preserved.

That reforestation is necessary to preserve the rivers of Ontario, was the point made by W. H. Breithaupt in an interesting paper before the Toronto Engineers' Club last night.

The watershed of the rivers running into the Georgian Bay, Lake Huron and Lake Erie, he said was about 1,000,000 acres. The evidence showed that the reforestation of the high and low levels of these rivers was about 15 feet, that is, when the rivers were not running low, were wooded and causing little damage. The variations in the levels had increased greatly since the forests with which this part of the country are at one time been covered, were destroyed.

The remedies suggested by Mr. Breithaupt were first the construction of basins along these rivers, which would serve as reservoirs, and, secondly, the reforestation of about 400 square miles of country, including Luther Township and vicinity. The reservoirs would regulate the levels, while the reforestation would serve not only to regulate the flow, but to preserve the sources of the rivers.

A. B. Barry, who presided at the meeting, announced that the committee appointed to look into the matter of new quarters had arranged to extend the lease of the present club rooms for another year. During this time the committee will look about for other quarters.
