DEPLORE VICE-REGAL ATTENDANCE AT RACES

Baptist Association Pass a Resolution Which Dr. Sowerby Adds to—Position on Temperance.

The laymen's missionary movement was the principal topic before the Toronto Association of Baptist Churches yesterday. The discussion was led by Joseph N. Shenstone. The churches of the denomination intend to raise \$200,000 for this movement, \$50,000 of which will be raised by city churches alone, Jarvis-street contributing \$15,000.

The resolution committee brought in their report and submitted the following resolution:

"That since righteousness exalteth the nations, resolved that it is the duty of the church of Christ to teach the responsibility of citizenship for the domination of moral law in national life and legislation;

"That we recommend to the churches of our association that they receive speakers on behalf of the temperance and moral reform committee to lay its work and objects before our people;

"That in view of the license reduction campaign, which will be undertaken in our city next fall, our city churches be respectfully asked to co-operate with those who are carrying forward that work, and that with our Young People's Society, this year they have this question a very prominent place in their activities;

"Resolved, that as an association of Baptist churches we view with alarm and deplore the patronage of the race-track by many representative people in high places, as being a pernicious example, and that we recommend to our churches energetic action in combating the evils of race-track betting and all other forms of gambling;

In this connection Dr. Sowerby of College-street Church said: "I would like to call the attention of this association to an item in this morning's press, where it says 'Earl Grey and suite left in a private car for Montreal, to attend the spring meeting at Blue Bonnets' track. I can only deplore such a thing as that and Earl Grey's many visits to the Woodbine while in Toronto."

Resolutions were also passed putting the superannuation ministerial fund on a purely benevolent basis and also drawing attention to the fearful extent of the opium trade in British Columbia.
