

ANOTHER CANARD RAISED BY "CATARACT" GROWD

Declare City Can't Use H.E. Power Direct—Important Committee Meetings—Day's Happenings.

HAMILTON, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—The "Cataract" aldermen and press are working in circles. After exhausting all their stock of objections to the city joining the hydro-electric power project, they have gone back to the beginning, and to-day trotted out one of the mare's nests that had been disposed of several months ago, and associated with a wire sensation. It is the moss-covered canard about it being impossible to use the power direct from the line of the hydro-electric commission. In account of the high voltage, and they quote Paul J. Myler as saying that it would cost \$12,000 extra to get motors for the beach pumps if such power was used. Mr. Myler denied to several of the aldermen to-night that he had ever made such a statement, his greatest estimate of the difference in cost being between \$4000 and \$5000.

New Teachers.

The following were appointed as public school teachers by the internal management committee this evening: Misses K. A. Smith, C. A. Lochee, J. M. McKenzie and R. MacKlem. No action was taken in the application of Miss Savage for two more kindergarten teachers. William Bell, K.C., said he had heard that pupils who failed to pass the entrance examinations were sometimes admitted on the recommendation of the chairman of the board. This was denied, it being explained that the examining board sometimes recommended the admission of pupils who were "plucked." Trustee Callahan objected to the time teachers took off on the plea of illness. Miss Smith, a teacher of modern languages at the college, will be given the same pay as male teachers, because she is a specialist. The salary of J. B. Turner, vice-principal of the college institute, will be advanced by yearly instalments of \$100 to \$200.

Recommend Five Wards.

The finance committee this afternoon decided to recommend the re-division of the city into five wards, with three aldermen from each ward, instead of seven with three aldermen each. Action was deferred until the next meeting of the committee. The parks board to purchase a beach park at \$20,000. Ald. Hopkins said it would take \$60,000 to make the property fit for a park. The sale of 100 school debentures was deferred, it being thought that next January would be a more favorable time, only \$7.37 being offered for the issue.
