

### SUBMARINE SINKS **AMERICAN VESSEL**

Ten Americans Were Aboard Algonquin-No Lives Reported Lost.

New York, March 14 .- The Amerian steamship Algonquin, with ten Americans aboard, was sunk by a German submarine on March 12, with a loss of vessel and cargo valued at \$1.700,000. A cable message received here today by her owners, the American Star Line, and despatches from London, told of the apparent safety of all the efficers and crew, 27 of whom have been landed. The message told the owners that the vessel was torpedoed, but did not indicate where she was at the time. According to a consular report from Plymouth, England the Algonquin's centerin stat. The collections are valued at 175,000 pesos, or about \$87,500.
