

HOSPITAL HAS DEFICIT OF NINE THOUSAND

Forty-Third Annual Meeting of Institution For Treatment of Incurables Held Yesterday.

The forty-third annual meeting of the Toronto Hospital for Incurables and the graduating exercises of the Training School for Nurses took place yesterday afternoon, with Sir John Hendrie in the chair.

Owing to increased cost of living the financial statement showed an overdraft of \$9,182.30 for the past twelve months.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. R. L. Sherman, Sir John Hendrie in his address, referred to the late Sir Mortimer Clark and to his long connection with the institution.

Dr. Alexander Davidson addressed the graduating class; Rev. Newton Forsyth spoke of the system and good spirit of the house, and Mrs. Ambrose Kent and Mrs. Grant Macdonald presented the medals and diplomas.

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Works Committee Recommends Improvement in Spite of Council's Avoiced Policy of Economy.

In the face of the city council's decision against local improvements until the financial situation improves, the works committee yesterday sent on to the council a recommendation that Kingston road, between Balsam and Silverbirch avenues, be widened at a cost of \$3,000.

By extending the street as a local improvement some \$20,000 would be paid by the property owners, but the council as this was deemed essential to 22 houses on the street.

Assessment Reductions. Empress Hotel Among Properties on Which Figures Were Lowered.

Richard Disette appeared before the Court of Revision yesterday to ask for a reduction in the assessment on the Empress Hotel at the corner of Yonge and Gould streets.

He said that the rental of it had been reduced from \$15,100 to \$13,000, and the land assessment on the front 17 feet six inches was reduced from \$1,450 to \$1,300 a foot.

W. B. Becker was given a reduction of \$400 on the building which he owns at 468 Yonge street from the assessment of \$2,200.
