SCORE DRURY GRANT

Washington, Dec. 14.—Sessions of the international communications conference, threatened by disruption several days ago, over failure to agree on disposition of the German cables, will continue under a modus vivendi adopted today at a plenary session.

CHIEF RETAIL DECREASE IS IN
SUGAR; WHOLESALE IN GRAINS,
MEATS AND FOODS.

Ottawa, Dec. 14.—(Can. Press)—During the month of November the prices movement continued downward, according to the statement published in The Labor Gazette.

CHIEF DECREASES.

In wholesale prices the chief decreases were in grains, animals and meats, miscellaneous foods, textiles, metals, coke, paints, oil and glass, chemicals and raw wool. There were slight increases in prices of dairy products and fresh vegetables.

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LEAGUE OF NATIONS DECIDES TO
GO SLOW IN VIEW OF U. S.
AND ENEMY NATIONS REMAINING
OUTSIDE—AGREE TO
LIMIT EXPENDITURE FOR TWO
YEARS TO LAST YEAR'S APPROPRIATIONS.

Geneva, Dec. 14.—The first step for disarmament of the nations must be cautious and deliberate, the assembly of the League of Nations decided today, despite sharp criticisms by George Nicolai Barnes, the British labor leader, and Christian Lange of Norway.—Mr. Barnes said there was "too much quibble and not enough pluck" in the decisions to go slowly.

CONGRESS IS ASKED
AGAIN TO BUTT IN

Washington, Dec. 14.—Congress, under a resolution introduced today by Representative Burke, republican, of Pennsylvania, would go on record as appealing to the British government to withdraw its armed forces from Ireland and to give recognition to the government established by the majority will of the Irish people.

FRANCE AND BELGIUM ACCEPTED THE

Accepting With Limitations. France and Belgium accepted the committee's conclusions upon limitations of armament expenditures during the next two years on the basis of a decrease as a steady means of bringing about eventual, but remote, general disarmament.

PREMIER OUTLINES
NEW PARTY IDEA

Caucus of U. F. O. Members of
House Generally Give It
Approval.

SOME ISSUES ARE SHELVED

The U.F.O. members of the legislature held a caucus at the parliament buildings yesterday, when, it is understood, the premier's proposal for a people's party, with a platform broad enough to attract all shades of political thought, was the principal matter up for discussion, and took up the greater part of the session. While there was said to be some objection to the idea, it found, however, approval in the minds of most of those present.

MERCHANDISE MARKS ACT
PREPARED FOR BRITAIN

London, Dec. 14.—The house of commons discussed the naval and other supplementary estimates and several bills of minor importance. The legislative program has already been lightened by the temporary abandonment of some dozen small measures.
