# **BREED LIVE STOCK MINISTERS' SLOGAN**

### Backbone of Agricultural Life, Declares Dr. Tolmie-Dairy Business Better.

"It is the federal agricultural department's policy to encourage mixed farming thruout Canada with live stock as its base," said Dr. S. F. Tolmie, minister of agriculture for the Dominion, at the banquet held in the King Edward Hotel last night of the Holstein Friesian Association. "It is the farmer who breeds live stock that is the backbone of our stock that is the backbone of our agricultural life," he said, and his opinion was that nothing would keep a man steadler on the farm than having live stock to attend to, and if he goes in for good breeding and good live stock, he will make it pay."

If he goes in for good breeding and good live stock, he will make it pay." There was vast room for improve-ment in the dairy business, he said. A man who took a pride in breeding good cows made a profit, while the man who did not pay much atten-tion to breeding, and was content with the ordinary run of cattle, got little else out of it but the fresh air and exercise. The Federal depart-ment had appointed an officer to go about the country making tests as to the food values of milk products with a view of encouraging the consump-tion of dairy products in Canada. We should produce all we can at home, and sell as much of our own produce in Canada as is possible. **Prospects for Agriculture.** Giving some figures to show the wonderful prospects for agriculture in Canada, Dr. Toimie stated that less than ten per cent. of the land which could be farmed was under cultiva-tion Seven billions of dollars had been invested in agriculture up to 1918, and the amount invested was casen.


**CHARGE WESTERNER Rhyming Views** WITH KILLING THREE

> Declare Grande Prairie Farmer Responsible for Wholesale Murder.

Edmonton, Feb. 9.-Word has just been received from Grande Prairie, from Chief Detective Nicholsor, of the provincial police, that Richard Knochel, a farmer of that district, had been arrested charged with the murder of three men, ten miles from Grande Prairie in June, 1918. For almost three years the quadruple mur-der has remained unsolved, together with two other murders a short dis-tance away on the same day. The accused man married the widow of one of the murdered men shortly after the tragedy the tragedy.

He was arrested early this morning at his shack, about one mile from the scene of the murders.


