JIMMY COCKMAN HELPED AMATEURS

Guelph, May 2.—(Special).—The Amateur Athletic Union, Ontario branch, has written a letter to the secretary of the O.B.A.A. of this city objecting to Jimmy Cockman holding office in the Guelph Amateur Baseball League, stating that as Mr. Cockman is a former professional baseball player, he is not eligible to hold office in an amateur organization. The officers of the O.B.A.A. were fully aware that Mr. Cockman held office in past years, but did not care to interfere, appreciating the work he had done for amateur baseball in Guelph. Now that the athletic union has raised the point, there is no alternative for the Guelph amateur league than to ask for Mr. Cockman's resignation, which he will very willingly give. This action will not interfere in any way with Mr. Cockman's work as an umpire, and his services as a coach will be very acceptable. His successor will be appointed by a special meeting of the local association this week.

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EXPECT THE PLATERS AT CONNAUGHT PARK

Jockey Club at Ottawa Will Offer Special Inducements to Canadian Horses.

Ottawa, May 3.—Canadian owned and Canadian bred horses will get a great figure on the Dominion tracks during the coming racing season. The Jockey Club at Ottawa will offer special inducements to Canadian breeders and owners, and the majority of the Ontario and Quebec owners carried on their breeding and training establishments with the result that they will have big fields to face the barriers in the Canadian events on the big tracks this summer.
In accordance with a decision reached some time ago, the Connaught Park Jockey Club will offer special inducements to Canadian bred horses, and will meet at Connaught Park, June 19 to 22, to run a race for Canadian bred horses, and a regular season will be held at the King's Plate, which will be won in action over the Ayrmer, Hendrie, Rose, The Seagram, Dymond, Walker, Lumsden and other Canadian bred horses, and will be held at the Connaught Park Jockey Club.
It is probable that in addition to the day races for Canadian bred horses, there will be a couple of amateur contests over the jumps. These proved very popular prior to the war, and various Hunt Clubs are resuming activities. It should not be difficult to have these attractive events filled up. There will be a meeting of the management of the Connaught Park Jockey Club on Monday next, when further arrangements in connection with the spring meeting will be made. Work is being rushed at Connaught Park, and when the big invasion of horsemen and lovers of the sport takes place in June, Connaught Park will be one of the finest racing plants on the continent.
Jerry Gorman, the well-known Ottawa breeder, is now at Toronto helping Gorman the promising three-year-old, who is for the King's Plate race. He also has a lively two-year-old, which is developing well.
