Kuroki made his first attempt to cross the Taitse River late in the evening under cover of a heavy bombardment of the extreme Russian left. Raferty of The Chicago Tribune, in a letter dated from Toronto to his paper, says: Here, more than anywhere else in Canada, you will hear reciprocity, free trade and commercial unity denounced as little less than treason, since, according to the tariff orators and publicists, each in turn is but an entering wedge for annexation and a parting of the ways with the British empire and the flag of England. As a strictly utilitarian policy, however, reciprocity with the United States commends itself to the majority of the electorate of Toronto, as it does to the majority of the voters of all the Province of Ontario. Importers, jobbers, wholesalers and consumers realize that they are gradually "falling into the hands" of the manufacturers. If they could strip the reciprocity question of its sentimental and bigoted aspects, they would be for it by a large majority. The bread and butter voice of the majority cries for reciprocity; but sentimentalism, in answer, cries treason. Meanwhile the manufacturers do the lobbying; the Liberal government's hands are tied by the uniformly antagonistic posture of the Washington congress, and its feet are bound in waiting upon the British decision upon Chamberlainism. In a word, Toronto and the tariffites of Ontario are for the Chamberlain plan so far as it will help Canada by shutting out the United States.
