Government Party In Carleton is Desperate

Woodstock, N. B., Sept. 19.—These are anxious days for the government. The people are turning against graft and the men who are condoning it. Every day there are many additional supporters for the cause of better government and the opposition candidates, McCain and Upham.

Minister Murray and Baxter are both trying to stem the tide of public opinion. They cannot do it. The campaign, disclosing conditions in the government of the province as they are, exposing the graft and opportunism that have discredited the government, has had a tremendous effect.

But the opposition realize that opposed to public sentiment there will be a huge campaign fund. The resources of the Fleming-Todd "campaign" fund have half demands made upon it. Every government contractor has felt the pressure of the need of the government. Today the cry is "Save Smith." The party has abandoned Sutton. There will be much hard feeling in the government ranks after the battle is over because of these cut-throat methods.

A big effort is being made to persuade the independent electors not to forsake both government candidates, but to vote for Smith if they cannot vote for both of them. The Standard and other government newspapers have made themselves ridiculous by their misrepresentations. Today they had H. M. Blair with A. B. Copp at Coldstream, while as a matter of fact the former was laid up with a severe sore throat. Then, again, Mr. Carvell, according to the Standard, was in Ottawa collecting a campaign fund, when he was just from a severe attack of tonsillitis which prevented him from remaining in the campaign.

THE ARNHILL STATEMENT

(Fredericton Mail.)

We have just read through what the Standard and the Gleaner say in answer to the statements made in the solemn declaration of Robert J. Arnhill concerning the payment of \$2,000 to James H. Crockett. That declaration contained very serious matter. It would call for immediate action by the government, if we had a government in this province which dare act. After reading the defence, one naturally asks: What is the use of all this denial of things which Mr. Arnhill never said, while they neglect to deal with the serious things which he did say?

The substance of Mr. Arnhill's statement may be put in a very few words, namely, that a large sum of money was owing to his firm; that they had tried for months to get it from the railway company and from the government, and had not succeeded; that finally they stated that they would contribute \$2,000 if they got their money; that shortly after they did get their money, namely, the settlement of this Smith & Morris account was a private transaction with which the government had nothing to do; that Crockett got the money, but it was given to him as the price of his strong friendship for the manager of the Hibbard Co.

In the first place the settlement of these railway claims was a matter in which the government had a most direct interest. By legislation and by the promises of the ministers, the government had undertaken to see that all legitimate claims against the road were paid. In May, 1915, a notice was published by the government in the Royal Gazette notifying all persons who had claims in connection with the road to file them, and then a commissioner was appointed

by the government, first Mr. Dunlop and then Mr. Blaisdell, to adjust these and arrange a settlement.

The province had supplied all the money that went into the railway, and by Chapter 9 of the acts of assembly of 1915, the government has taken power to itself to forfeit the road to the province if satisfactory arrangements were not made by the Gould Co. for the completion of the road.

Section 4 of that act provides: "In the event of the company failing within such time as the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council may determine, to make arrangements satisfactory to the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council for the completion of the railway, the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council may, by order published in the Royal Gazette, vest all the shares of the capital stock of the said company issued prior to the date of the publication of said order, in His Majesty on behalf of the province."

All the government had to do under this section was to pass the necessary order-in-council, and take the road over as the property of the province. This was done by order-in-council of Aug. 4th, 1915, published in the Royal Gazette of Aug. 12th, 1915. This order-in-council, after setting out that the St. John & Quebec Railway Co. had been given twenty days to make satisfactory arrangements to complete the railway, provided as follows:

"The provincial secretary-treasurer, in consequence of such arrangements not having been made, and in pursuance of the provisions of said section four of said Chapter 9 of said Act 5, George V., now recommends that all the shares of the capital stock of the said company issued prior to the date of the publication of the order-in-council of August 4th, 1915, be vested in His Majesty on behalf of the province, free from all liens, pledges, charges or other encumbrances, except the lien in favor of the Prudential Trust Co., Ltd., as presently existing in respect to 15,748 shares, with power to transfer said shares, or any of them, to such persons as may from time to time be designated by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council to be held by them in trust for the province, with all such further and other powers in respect to such shares as are given by said Act."

The Lieutenant Governor-in-Council adopted this recommendation. By this order, therefore, the province took all the shares of the Railway Co., and made the company in fact a department of the government, and became responsible for the settlement of all the claims.

The government also appointed five directors to manage the affairs of the company, namely, Irving S. Todd, Edward Girouard, John D. Palmer, W. S. Fisher and Richard O'Leary, and the government gazetted Mr. Todd as president, Mr. Girouard as secretary, and Mr. Palmer as treasurer, and the claims which were settled were approved of by these men and the cheques in settlement were issued by them and the money used was provided by the Province of New Brunswick.

The dates on which the money for this purpose was handed over by the government to the commission, and the amounts, was given in an answer in the legislature during the last session. On page 88 of the Appendix to the Synoptic Report, Hon. Dr. Landry, in reply to a question by Mr. Douglas, says:

The management of the exhibit is in the hands of the commercial intelligence branch of the Board of Trade and its purpose is to ascertain whether the products can be made by Canadian manufacturers and sold as cheaply, in order that after the war the proposed commercial warfare against Germany and Austria may be prosecuted to advantage.

The exhibit will be seen first in Montreal. Later it will be sent to Toronto. Expert commercial agents will accompany the exhibit and get information as to what lines of manufacture in Canada now will duplicate the German and Austrian goods with cost and selling prices, and shipping facilities. Where the goods to be exhibited are not now manufactured in Canada an effort will be made to get information as to establishing similar industries.

The British Board of Trade is making several collections of goods manufactured in the Central Power countries and will keep them circulating in the various British colonies and dependencies for the purpose of forming a world-wide combination against Germany and Austria in manufactures and commerce.
