THE MARITIME FORWARD MOVEMENT

(Maritime Merchant)

The day on which our last issue was published was the day of the Maritime Forward Movement convention at Amherst, the deliberations of which were reported at very considerable length in the newspapers. As might be expected there is a difference of opinion as to the success of this conference, some who attended saying that it was impractical and useless and others going so far as to pronounce it the most successful effort in the history of the movement. The conference experienced the usual shortcomings of a first attempt, just as we might have expected it to. But because it did not accomplish things that were practical it should not be presumed that it did not do things that in the long run will be useful. Every bit of progress in the world has ever been made due to some individual having a new idea that proved to be a good one. The world has been benefited because it was passed along and it is as a medium for passing such ideas along that the Amherst Movement will have its greatest usefulness.

If we have any criticism of the meeting it would be that several of the addresses were somewhat aside from the purpose of the programme. The chairman in his address stated that the conference was designed to increase the confidence of Maritime people in their own section of the country, and to encourage co-operation for the general good of all. Many of the addresses were absolutely to the point and were very inspiring, but some were most unfortunate in this respect. We do not need to particularize for anyone who was there or who read the reports in the newspapers will know exactly what we mean. The occasion in our opinion was not one on which to talk of our woes and sufferings; it was a time to talk about our strong points and why we should be hopeful.

It is quite all right that the people should be told what the troubles of certain individuals are, but this was not the time to do it, and their being told more or less neutralized the good influence of the cheerful reports of other speakers.

Now, looking to the future, the next question is, has such a convention any prospective value as a permanent institution, having annual meetings at some central point in the province? We believe that it has. We believe that an annual assembly of maritime provinces men, where especially prepared addresses would be given on subjects in which we are all directly or indirectly interested, should have a great usefulness. Such a gathering would be especially appreciated by men who live in the smaller places, and have few opportunities to hear ad-

dress on industrial or business questions. Those of us who live in the cities and can hear lectures of one kind and another every week, value these things too cheaply because of their frequency, but it isn't that they would be regarded in the smaller places. These annual conferences could be made the clearing house of the Maritime Provinces thought with regard to industrial and business matters. The addresses given would embody the special knowledge which the writer had accumulated on his own subject. And what an educational influence these should have, and what an inspiration to the younger men of the provinces to take part in them. The time might come when to be chosen to read a paper before such an assembly, would be considered an unquestioned badge of ability. No doubt each year's addresses would be made in competition with the standard of the previous year, and thus they would gradually reach a very high grade of excellence. And when we say "excellence," we do not only mean literary finish; we mean helpfulness, we mean practical suggestions that if followed would make for greater efficiency in the people of the provinces, and for greater confidence among us in the opportunities of the home field. These things seem to us to be worth trying for. We think no one will say that they are not.

Now, we have endeavored, perhaps feebly, to point to some things that such an assembly, meeting annually, should be able to do. We shall now mention one or two things which in our opinion it should not do. It should not attempt to usurp the functions of a responsible legislative body. It should not vote on resolutions except in very rare instances—practically never. The Maritime Board of Trade lost its opportunity for influence by passing quantities of resolutions that would not stand careful analysis. A member of the Federal Parliament one time told us that he thought the Maritime Board had passed more foolish resolutions in its time, than any deliberative body he knew of in the world. This was a very serious condemnation, and yet we feel quite sure that it was deserved. The new institution must try to avoid this mistake, and we trust, therefore, it will be very careful indeed about taking a vote on any question.

There is another caution that we would give it and it is to eschew the politician, as politician. If these gentlemen wish to attend simply as business men and expect no special prominence in the proceedings, well and good, and to see them, but to feature them in the deliberations, will in our opinion be a mistake. Why not let us try to have one informal organization, where the politician will sit in the back row, unless there are very good business reasons why he should be called to the front. There is no doubt that in many cases he does not wish to take a spot light upon himself, he would be much happier to let his name be called to the front, and his own side expects him to see that he makes the most of his opportunities. It must be clear that his recognition as a politician does not make for harmony,

In closing our reference to the "Amherst Movement," we can say that we hope the men who have undertaken to carry it forward will realize that they have entered upon the construction of a machine which is intended to influence Maritime Province thought and action, and that in some cases, this machine may perhaps alter the point of view of the younger men of the provinces to such an extent, as to be worth trying for. We think no one will say that they are not.

Mayor John F. Hurley, of Salem, Mass., was recalled by the voters in a special election last week. Matthias J. O'Keefe, leather manufacturer and candidate of the Better Government Association, defeating him, 8,460 to 2,009. It was the first recall election in New England.

In the campaign the opposition charged that Mayor Hurley had not enforced the liquor laws. He had been the executive head of the city five times and is widely known as the "Silk Hat Mayor."

Mayor Hurley visited St. John about five years ago. At that time he attracted considerable attention in the streets because of his costume of all hat, sack coat, plain vest, light blue socks and fawn colored spats, to say nothing of his luxuriant denture. His comments on St. John as "a one-horse town," made popular the query "Where is Salem, anyway?"

BOYS OF SIXTEEN FOR THE ARMY OF GERMANY

Berne, Jan. 2.—The Bavarian press contains the announcement that on and after January 2, the military training institution of the Potsdam Guards will be prepared to receive volunteers between the ages of sixteen years and sixteen years and nine months, the height of candidates to be not less than five feet three inches. All volunteers must possess the usual requirements of a parent or guardian and a birth certificate.
An official statement gives the German losses among army doctors 842, of whom 112 were slightly wounded, forty seriously, one ill, sixty-five dead (including those who died of disease), seventy-five missing and forty-six captured in all nearly three per cent of the total number of doctors in the German army.
