W. E. Anderson Presents Matters at Luncheon of Gyro Club

Saint John's greatest need, from the standpoint of securing tourist traffic, is a municipal golf course, W. E. Anderson, secretary-manager of the New Brunswick Tourist Association, told the Gyro Club at their luncheon at the Admiral Beatty Hotel yesterday.

Mr. Anderson said that visitors to the city see the chief points of interest in a few hours and then, not having anywhere else to go, move on. He advocated the establishment of the golf links as an even greater necessity than links as an even greater necessity than a first class hotel on the Saint John River. Kenneth A. Gault presided. W. J. Simonds gave a brief talk on the stove manufacturing industry.


tal Saturday night. The winner of the reund will meet the Victoria Cougars on Eastern ice for the Stanley Cup starting next Tuesday.
