While no definite arrangements have been made at this early date, the contemplated tour would include such countries as Norway, Sweden, Finland, England and Germany, as well as Canada and the United States.

Gorman will communicate with the Chicago promoter this week and further developments will be awaited with interest.

The league is to be organized on a basis of equal representation from the leading newspapers and periodicals of those States which offered the greatest number of potential spectators. He advocated the establishment of the golf links as an even greater necessity than a first class hotel on the Saint John River. Kenneth A. Gault presided. W. J. Simonds gave a brief talk on the stove manufacturing industry.

TRACES GROWTH

Mr. Anderson traced the inception and growth of the Tourist Association and showed how its scope had been extended during recent years. The present aim, he said, was to make it the most widely known organization of its kind on the continent. The possibilities for tourist travel in New Brunswick were unlimited. Committees for the furtherance of the association program were being organized in all the principal cities and towns of the province, with the chairman of each sitting as a member of the central executive at Saint John. This would enable the various localities to realize that their best interests were being looked after and that the province was not being exploited for the benefit of any section.

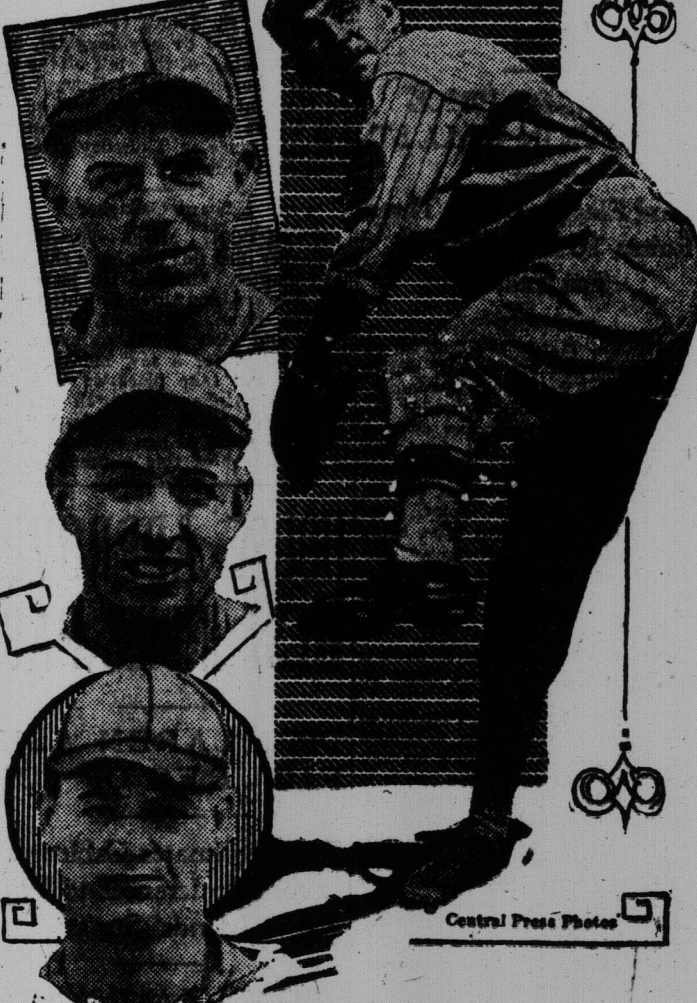

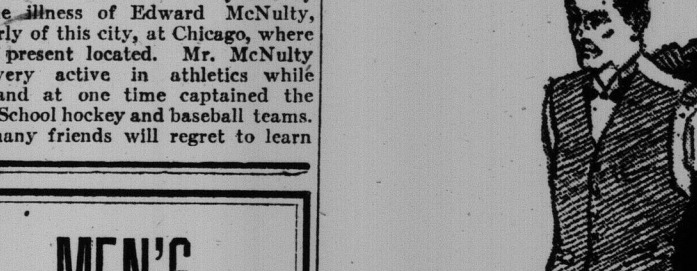
