SECESSION MOVEMENT MAY COME TO HEAD AT C. A. A. U. ANNUAL

DOMINION BODY TO HOLD MEETING HERE THIS SUMMER FOR FIRST TIME IN HISTORY

Sentiment Quietly Growing That Provinces Could Better Handle Affairs Separately Than Through Union As Advocated By Halifax Wanderers

FOR THE FIRST TIME IN HISTORY the annual meeting of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Association will be held in Saint John in September of this year and the suggestion is put forward that no better time for overhauling the entire sport situation in the Maritime Provinces with particular regard to the break-up of the M. P. B. and grant the three provinces authority to conduct its own business by its own provincial association will be had than at this gathering. In this talk about secession, it must not be forgotten that the first move was made by a Nova Scotia club, the Halifax Wanderers, and if this shows how Nova Scotia feels about it, as near as The Times-Star can judge, how New Brunswick feels the same.

No responsible amateur leader has yet come out with a definite statement in regard to this matter but to date none of them have come out strongly condemning such a course. On the contrary, it is believed most of them favor such a course in the best interests of amateur sport. What the real influence behind this movement which has originated in Nova Scotia is not known but apparently one of the most influential clubs in the Maritime body an organization that in the last few years has staged several big meets, notably the Dominion track and field championships and which always has been looked on as a leader in Maritime sport, is not satisfied with the way the ship is being run and a change of captain and crew in their opinion seems desirable.

RADICAL CHANGE
The change is a radical one and it made must be sanctioned by the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, which, it so happens, will hold its annual meet in Saint John this September. "The case for the Maritimes" to borrow a political phrase, if it is to be presented at all, should be made ready for presentation at this meeting and if there is concerted action, it seems reasonable to suppose that the request will be granted. Undoubtedly, there would be opposition to such a change and the upheaval, which will follow will cause considerable adjustment. The ones to decide this matter are the individual clubs in the union and they decide the issue on the basis of the various members. In the final analysis, they have the say. The Times-Star reiterates this is one of the most important issues ever raised in the history of Maritime sport, affecting vitally the future of amateurism down east and for this reason it is giving prominence to it and will welcome other views on it.
