

N. B. Power Co. Makes City Preposterous Offer

(Continued from page 1.) To bring the existing distributing system to efficiency. The balance for the first year's operation, putting into effect the lowest practicable hydro rates and making no allowance for increased consumption, can be drawn with fair certainty as follows:—

Estimated Balance Sheet for First Year's Operation by City Under Mr. Bodell's Proposal. Table with columns for item and amount.

First—That the statement of the proposed lighting rates as incorporated therein in the name as the writer has worked out as being the most satisfactory rate to put in force at the outset of operations. In case the Power Company is bought out or whether the city puts in its own distributing system. In case the Power Company is purchased there will be a substantial surplus after one year's operation to apply against sinking fund and depreciation, as pointed out in your report. If the city builds its own distributing system these rates will apply for an estimated period of three years, after which the New Brunswick Power Company maintains competitive operations, at which time there will in all probability be a substantial surplus over all previous costs of operation to apply against sinking fund and depreciation reserve.

Second—That the estimated balance sheet for the first year's operation under the conditions as outlined in Mr. Bodell's proposal agrees substantially with the figures which the writer has already prepared for his own information, there being a small difference in the operating expenses which would have no material effect on the final result. We consider your estimate sufficiently high to cover this item. Your estimate of receipts is very conservative, since you do not take into account any additional revenue received from the load, which would undoubtedly be secured owing to the very great reduction in the proposed rates over these at present in force.
