


An enquiry into the loss of the pilot boat Howard D. Troop was held in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday afternoon by Captain Hendrie, of the admiralty service, Halifax, assisted by Captain A. J. Mulcahy, of this city, and Captain Orde, of the S. S. Dunaff Head. Evidence was given by Pilot F. McKelvic, master of the lost vessel; Captain J. D. MacKenzie, master of the Canadian Voyageur; Pilot S. Spears, W. J. Beaver, chief engineer of the steamer, and James Jackson, third engineer. Pilot McKelvic told about the collision and said that when his boat was drawing under the steamer's bow he endeavored to start his auxiliary motor, but was unable to do so. Chief Engineer Beaver attributed the accident to the fact that there was excessive pressure in the cylinders and as a result he could not get the engines to reverse or go ahead for five minutes. Fred Taylor, K. C., appeared for the pilot boat owners, and Edward C. Wyman for the Canadian Government Merchant Marine service.


