CINCINNATI PLAYERS!

ASSAULTED BY FANS

Crowd Sore on Reds For Defeating Giants and Hurt Pop Bottles at Neale and Magee

New York, Aug. 18—The crowd which saw the New York Giants beaten twice by the Cincinnati Reds in the third of their successive series of double-headers was the greatest in baseball history, and it also ruined all the reputation New York has had as a fair baseball city.

More than 40,000 fans were in the stands and bleachers, and from 5,000 to 10,000 more were raving, swearing and raging outside the gates trying to batter their way into the Polo Grounds. Impatient because of the jam outside the gates, the crowds before the game crashed through both the 8th Avenue and Speedway gates and climbed over the turnstiles.

Declaring that the crowds gave a "disturbing exhibition of rowdiness," one correspondent describes the incidents as follows: "In two instances outfielders of the Red team—Neale in the sixth inning of the first game and Magee in the seventh—were the targets for pop bottles as they caught difficult flies close to the outfield walls. These occurrences alarmed Pat Moran and he appealed to the Giant management for protection, and for the first time in years city policemen were sent inside the Polo Grounds. A squad of them lined up under the right field wall and the trouble makers confined their attacks after that to verbal abuse.

In the ninth inning of the second game, with two men out, a mob of bleacher rowdies leaped over the barriers and swooped down to the field. The game was delayed fifteen minutes, 8,000 to 4,000 men and boys surrounded Neale and Magee and preventing all possibility of play. The fans finally landed into a corner until the game was completed."

AFTER 5-MILE TITLE

Metropolitan A. A. U. Meet Attracts Leading Athletes and Runners of District

New York, Aug. 18—Hanes Kolehmainen, sturdy Finnish distance runner of a few years ago, is to attempt a "come-back" next Saturday at Pershing Athletic Field, Jersey City. Kolehmainen has notified officials of the Metropolitan A. A. U. that he will strive for the five-mile title in the local association's annual senior outdoor track and field championships, which will be the opening feature at the new Jersey City athletic field.
