Pipe Tenders—Again The Matter of New City Hall—Beverly Stevens Gets \$1,000 Appointment

SPILLED POISON ON FOOD IN DARK; THEN ATE SOME

Life of Irving D. Appleby of Nauvegauc Saved, But it Was a Close Call.

Irving D. Appleby, of Nauvegauc, had a very narrow escape from death on Friday night of last week, when, in getting a lunch in the dark just before retiring, he accidentally spilled a large amount of deadly poison on some food, most of which he ate before he became aware of what had happened.

Some hours of hard work on his part were necessary before his temporary safety was assured, and Mr. Appleby was not pronounced safe until some time later. He is now in a very weak condition, and it will be a long time before he will be able to take up his work again.

WILL GO INTO CAMP TWENTY-FOUR STRONG. Uniforms issued to Signaling Recruits—Tribute in Fact That All Instructors Are Local Men.

The issue of the new uniforms to the recruits in the Canadian Signaling Corps No. 2 Section, of No. 6 Co. took place last evening in the new armory. The strength of the section means that so many new uniforms, and these were given out last evening, of course being the same as the others, khaki with French grey shoulder straps.

Recruiting has not been found to be difficult as signalling is a branch of the service which makes a strong appeal so that therefore the section will go full strength into camp on Tuesday next with twenty-four men, officers included, just three times as many as were taken under the old establishment. A signalling section from P. E. Island will join them at Sussex.
