ST. JOHN MAN IN WEST SAVES LIVES OF FIVE

Capt. Arthur L. McLean, Now of Vancouver, Comes Upon Upturned Craft With Five Men Clinging to it

Five men saved from a watery grave is the record of a St. John man who has been in the west hardly two weeks. He is Captain Arthur L. McLean for many years captain of the tug Westminister is now in command of the tug Westminister of Vancouver.

With his wife and family, Captain McLean left for Vancouver recently his purpose being to follow the low boat business there. One of the best low boat skippers at this port and with excellent credentials, he was not diffident in going to get a steamer at the Pacific port, and a fine tug, the Westminister, was placed under his command.

On April 9 Captain McLean made his latest rescue. He was approaching Vancouver in the Westminister with two stone lighters in tow when he was able to distinguish three men clinging to the bottom of an upturned yacht. The tug and her tow boat down the Esplanade wharf and as they came closer two more men were seen clinging to floating wreckage.

All were taken aboard the Westminister. The yacht had turned turtle in a squall and with the sea running at the time all would doubtless have gone to a watery grave had it not been for the former St. John tug boat captain.

Word reached the city in a letter from Captain McLean to a prominent shipping man here. While he has much to say of the country and his opinion of it he modestly makes little of his gallant act, giving but little detail.

BACK EAST AND WILL STAY IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Flowers said that he expected that he would have clear sailing all the way up to the capital. The other river boats will likely be put on their respective runs the first of next week. The crew report having seen little or no ice.

Later word by D. J. Parslow states that the Majestic arrived at Oromocto at 11 o'clock this morning, and that she would continue on to Fredericton.
