FOUR FAMILIES EVICTED.

East Boston tenants ejected and their effects thrown into the street. Boston, Feb. 8.—Four families living in the double wooden frame dwellings Nos. 91 and 93 Porter street, East Boston, were ejected yesterday morning, and their household effects thrown into the street.

The former owner of the houses, Dennis McCarthy, better known as "Dynamite," was ordered to vacate the premises on Wednesday, and having complied now resides at 33 Hayes street.

One family, that of Daniel D. Coughlin, still remains at No. 93. Two of the evicted tenants, William Murray and John O'Neill secured places of shelter for their families elsewhere before nightfall, but it was on a cold street that they were to spend the night.

It is thought the tenants were all put out for the non-payment of rent, and that the reason that the Coughlins were allowed to stay was that if no family were in the house, in the event of a fire taking place, the insurance on the property would not be forthcoming.

Mr. McCarthy said last evening that he brought the houses at private sale for \$2,400, from Henry Scamell, on March 7, 1888. The tenants, McCarthy said, were very backward in paying their rent, and every family had been ordered out by him on that account on many occasions, but they would not go.
