THE DEER HUNTING season in Maine closed on Saturday. The record of game shipped through Bangor was 3,113 deer and 138 moose, a decrease of 331 deer and one moose from 1899, but a gain of 150 deer over the season of 1898. There were less guides about than in former seasons.

SMALL FOX - Reports from the Gloucester County coast about smallpox are most encouraging. The disease is now confined to two or three houses which are completely quarantined. No new cases are reported, though in one of the lumber camps near Jansville there are quite a number of cases. This camp is isolated. Indications are that the disease will be stamped out in a few weeks. There has been no case within four miles of Bathurst.

Death of Mr. D. Crimmins. Mr. Daniel Crimmins, an old and well known resident of Chatham died on Saturday evening last at his home, after an illness from kidney trouble of about a month's duration. He was sixty years old and a native of Chatham, where, especially in former years, he was a leading staveholder, shipwright and contractor. Chaplain Latta's Lecture. Chaplain Latta, one of the clergymen who marched with the Canadian soldiers from Cape Town to Pretoria, delivered his well known lecture in Masonic Hall on Tuesday evening to a fair-sized audience, which ought to have been larger, under the

circles in his purpose, uncompromising when he believed himself to be right, a firm and reliable friend and, although a strong fighter and dogmatic antagonist was of too generous a nature to really be any man's enemy. His funeral, which took place on Saturday was very largely attended by citizens of all classes. The pall-bearers were Hon. L. F. Tweedie and Messrs. Janti. Ferguson, S. Habbobley, F. E. Wintlow, Wm. Anderson and John McDonald. The service was conducted by Rev. D. Henderson, pastor of St. Andrew's church, of which deceased was a valued member. Assisting ministers were Rev. T. G. Johnston, of Newcastle, and J. M. Maclean, of St. John's church, Chatham.

In his sermon on Sunday forenoon in St. Andrew's, Rev. D. Henderson said, amongst other things, that the men and women who linked the present and the past history of St. Andrew's church together, and who had helped in no small degree to build up and make the congregation what it was, were passing away and should be held in respect and lasting remembrance. Mr. MacLellan was one of those. He had gathered yesterday to pay the last honors to his remains. Coming from Pictou, the home of Nova Scotia Presbyterianism a very young man, he had joined himself to St. Andrew's and ever since been a faithful and consistent member of the church, standing firmly in the old paths. He was bold and undaunted in maintaining what he believed to be right, and loyal to his conscientious convictions, as every man should be. Indeed, many firmness seemed to be a peculiar trait in his character, and he was not a man to be easily swayed. 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
