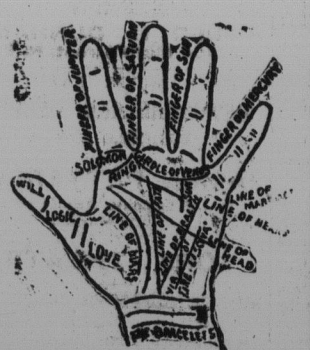

THE KING'S ILLNESS.

The news from London this morning has shocked the world. Just when the eyes of all were turned toward the capital of the empire, in anticipation of the great event of Thursday next, the news comes that King Edward has been compelled to undergo an operation which under the most favorable circumstances can only be regarded as a very serious one.

From great rejoicing the empire is plunged in an hour into profound grief and anxiety. The prayer of all his people will be that his majesty will speedily recover.

THE BOYS.

On Sunday afternoon during the rain a group of boys with several men spent a considerable time on the sheltered side of an old building in this city. The men had liquor, and from time to time drank from a bottle, and when it was empty they in some way secured a fresh supply. One of them had finally to be assisted by his companions to a place where he could sleep off the effects of too liberal potations.

The point to be particularly noted in connection with this affair is not its novelty; but it raises the question, What shall be done with loitering boys? Manifestly the influence exercised over this group of boys last Sunday was not for their good. The example was not edifying, and the thoughts expressed by the men would hardly be of an elevating nature. But it is not only on Sunday that one is painfully impressed by the fact that a great many boys in this city could be more profitably employed. It would probably surprise the citizens if they could learn exactly how many boys of school age are neither at school nor at work. There are some localities in the city where idle boys are entirely too much in evidence. It is surely time that steps were taken to secure a compulsory school law, applicable at least to this city. These boys do not realize what they are losing, and unhappily the parents of some are either utterly indifferent or not strong-minded enough to insist that the children attend school. A stringent and faithfully executed truant law would really be a blessing in such cases, and besides the good done to the children the city would be freed from a reproach.

SOUTH SHORE SERVICE.

The steamer Harlaw is still on the Newfoundland route and the government has not yet asked for tenders for a service between St. John and the Nova Scotia south shore ports. St. John merchants feel very strongly on this subject, because they are unable to give their south shore customers as prompt delivery of goods as formerly, and delay in business matters is always vexatious. It will be remembered that the Telegraph devoted large space to this subject not long since, and then suddenly dropped the question. The drop came when Halifax papers utilized the Telegraph's article to arouse feeling in that city to the prejudice of the interests of St. John. And Halifax members of the Telegraph's political party pulled the wires at Ottawa to prevent the transfer of the Harlaw to this route. Halifax influence in the cabinet being stronger than that of St. John, the former won; and Mr. Parmelee refused to consent to the transfer of the Harlaw. But if the government cannot consent to this transfer they might at least ask for tenders for a St. John service. Then the feeling that St. John had been deliberately slighted, which has been growing for more than a year, might be somewhat allayed. It is worth while for the Telegraph to whisper this fact in the ear of the government. The effort ought not to prove fatal to that journal, and would be a welcome contribution to efforts made by others for the benefit of the city's trade.

A BOER'S VIEW.

Writing to a lady in England, who had thanked him for kindness to her nephew, General Viljoen of the Boer army, after his capture and exile to St. Helena, said: "I observe your remark that you are not a pro-Boer. I do not quite understand what a pro-Boer is. Anyhow, I expect no Britisher to turn against his own people, as little as I hope you expect an Afrikaner to turn against his people." Evidently General Viljoen in his exile did not get an opportunity to read the speeches of some of the leaders of the liberal party in England. If he did read them, they would evidently arouse only the feeling of contempt for the speakers, in the breast of the sturdy Afrikaner—who expects Britishers and all other people to stand up for their own.

Senator Wood was elected delegate to the general board of missions, which meet at Brandon.

The ordination service was largely attended. Hammond Johnson and James M. Rice gave brief statements of their conversion and call to the ministry, and after having been set apart by the laying on of hands Dr. Read delivered an appropriate and impressive charge.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Rice Waffles.

One and one-half cups cold boiled rice, one and one-half pints of flour, one cup thin sour cream, one tablespoonful sugar, one teaspoonful soda, a teaspoonful of salt and three eggs. Beat eggs and sugar together and add to the rice and salt. Stir the soda into the cream and add to the first mixture, then stir in the flour. Beat to a batter, thin enough to pour, and bake in hot, buttered waffle irons.

Cream Doughnuts.

Beat a cup of sugar and three eggs together until light. Mix a teaspoonful of soda with a cup of sour cream and add to sugar and eggs; add a teaspoonful of salt and a little cream. Beat in enough cream and flour to make a smooth layer cake batter, about two cups, and bake in layers with maple cream icing between and on top.

Maple-Cream Cake.

Beat a heaping cupful of sugar with two eggs until light; then add a cup of sour cream in which you have dissolved a teaspoonful of soda. Beat in enough flour to make a smooth layer cake batter, about two cups, and bake in layers with maple cream icing between and on top.

Cream Cake.

Break one egg into a cup and fill it up with thin sour cream and beat together until light. Add a scant cup of sugar and beat again. Sift half a teaspoonful of soda with one and one-half cups of flour and a pinch of salt; add the flour to other mixture and beat until smooth and bake in a loaf, or in layers with cream filling.

The milkmen and conductors of the Montreal Street Railway are agitating for increased wages. The men are paid 15 cents per hour and will ask three cents an hour increase for week day work and five cents for Sunday.

THE BOURKE FIRE.

The water and sewerage board continued their inquiry at the City Hall yesterday afternoon into the complaint of the board of fire underwriters that there was delay in obtaining a sufficient supply of water at the Bourke fire on Water street on the 18th ult. After hearing a number of witnesses the aldermen found that there was ample water on that occasion, which was shown by the fact that when eleven streams were being played on the burning building there was plenty of water in the Emerson & Fisher building even on the fifth floor from water street. The members form all the evidence adduced were convinced that there was an ample supply by gravitation at the start of the fire and that streams were thrown over the roof of the building when the engines were got to work. These facts will be reported to the council. The board will recommend to the council that the safety board be asked to keep No. 2 engine in the north end hook and ladder station as a spare engine, and that they consider the obtaining of a new boiler for the same. The safety board will be asked to arrange for a new heater in No. 2 engine house so that the water in the boiler of the engine stationed there will always be hot. And the safety board will be asked to consider the advisability of engaging a few permanent men to go to fires with the drivers of the hose reels. The employment of an extra man in connection with each of the fire stations on this side of the harbor would cost in the neighborhood of \$2,500.

Hall, A. G. Leavitt, D. H. Jack, E. Phillips, Chief Engineer Kerr of the fire department, District Engineer Blake and a large number of firemen, permanent and call men.

It was agreed to let the engineer, Wm. Murdoch, test hydrants for the underwriters once a fortnight in business hours, the engineer to give 15 minutes' notice.

QUEBEC.

QUEBEC, June 23.—Lieut. Geo. McIntyre of Prince Edward Island, in town for the Laval celebration, was taken suddenly ill on the terrace this afternoon. His condition is not thought to be serious.

The celebration of St. Jean Baptiste fête and Laval anniversary began today by an open air mass on the Dufferin terrace. A cable was read from the Pope. The holy father thanks and blesses from the bottom of his heart the French-Canadians assembled at Quebec to celebrate their national fête. The blessing was pronounced by Mr. Falconio, papal delegate to Canada. At the banquet in the evening a message was read from the King expressing his appreciation of the loyalty of his French-Canadian subjects.

BOYS' BRIGADE BATTALION DRILL.

Last evening on King street east four companies of the Boys' Brigade held a battalion drill under the command of Capt. Buchanan of the Scots companies. Although some of the companies are not as well up in their drill as others, still the performance of last evening was a most creditable one. It is the intention of the battalion to attend divine service, along with other societies, at St. Stephen's Church on Thursday morning. Each company is requested to meet at St. Stephen's Church school room at 8.30 sharp.

DEATH OF E. F. LAW.

The death occurred last night of E. F. Law, who has for many years carried on business on Coburg street as a watchmaker and jeweller. Mr. Law was seized about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon with a fit of dizziness. Dr. Hannah was called in and he advised that Mr. Law be sent home at once. He was taken to his residence at the foot of Union street, where he died shortly afterward. Dr. Hannah said his death was due to heart failure. The deceased gentleman, who was held in high respect by all who knew him, was 63 years of age. He was born at St. Andrews and came here half a century ago. He was jeweller in the Sheffield house for 15 years, and had been in business on Coburg street for a longer period than that. He left a widow, son, Ernest, who was with him in his business, and a daughter, Miss Florence Law.

WHISKEY KILLED HIM.

Peter Brodie, a Barnardo Boy, Died From Excessive Drinking.

Peter Brodie, a Barnardo boy, aged 19, in the employ of James Peel, a South Verulam, Ontario, farmer, died last week from the effects of an overdose of whiskey. He and his employer drove some cattle to Lindsay, and after dinner Mr. Peel gave him 75 cents. When they started for home Brodie, already under the influence of liquor, produced a flask of whiskey, and, against the advice of Mr. Peel, drank it all, and finally from the effects fell asleep with his head hanging over the dashboard. When the house was reached they were alarmed to find Brodie black in the face and his breathing labored. Restoratives were applied, but without effect, as his heart stopped beating in a few minutes. Coroner Poole was summoned, but decided an inquest unnecessary, as the young man died from apoplexy, brought on by an overdose of raw whiskey.
