THE START OF A SANITORIUM.

Medical Society Recommends Establishment of Que.

Committee Presented Full Report Last Night

Doctors Decide to Raise Fees for Insurance Examination.

The afternoon session of the New Brunswick Medical men was largely taken up with a discussion on what fee should be charged by medical practitioners of the province in making medical examinations for the insurance companies and in considering the report made by the committee appointed to acquire information concerning the establishment of a sanatorium for the treatment of tuberculosis.

Previous to the main discussion the following papers were read: "Novel Method of Treating Fractured Patella," by Dr. A. B. Atherton, Fredericton, N. B.; "Dermoid Cyst of Ovary with Twisted Pedicle," by Dr. W. H. Irvine, Fredericton, N. B.; (a) "Fractured Clavicle Treated by Suturing," (b) "Novel Method of Treating Fractured Patella, with report of cases."

Paper by Dr. Murray McLaren, St. John, N. B., "Caustic Ligatures."

The report dealing with the matter of fees for medical examinations for the insurance companies was then brought forward.

This discussion was taken part in by President Myers, Dr. G. A. B. Addy, Dr. Murray McLaren, Dr. Melvin, Dr. Irvine, Dr. Daniel, Dr. Gaudet, Dr. A. B. Atherton, Thomas White, Dr. T. D. Walker, Dr. Thomas Walker and others.

At the close of the discussion the following resolution, moved by Dr. G. A. B. Addy, was unanimously passed: "That in the opinion of the N. B. Medical Society the minimum fee for life insurance examinations should be five dollars, and that a committee be appointed to negotiate with the various insurance companies for the purpose of having this idea carried into effect."

The report of the committee on the sanatorium question was read by the chairman, Dr. G. A. B. Addy. It states that in Canada last year there were 45,000 cases, with 8,000 deaths. That the committee recognizes that sea voyages and trips to better climates are impossible to the majority of the sufferers, and that therefore the first thing to be done is to build a sanatorium in the province.

It should be expressly built for the poor sufferers pining for fresh air, peace, rest and soothing surroundings. It should be in the country, it should face the sunny south, and in some pleasant spot where a range of hills should shelter it from the chilly breezes of the north, and the grounds would ward off the cutting, biting and killing breezes of the east, and the breeze from the west would subside the oft too boisterous western gales.

In tuberculosis treatment there are four considerations, viz., hygienic, climatic, dietetic, and medicinal, and all of these must be really a combination of them, namely, hygienic treatment.

1st. Hygienic—This treatment teaches the patient how to take care of his life, the food and drink he is to take, and the time for taking it. It regulates the hours to be spent out of doors, the amount of exercise, the things to do, and those not to do. It is apt to be rather unsuccessful, as the popular idea seems to be in opposition to this treatment.

2nd. Climatic—The climate of New Brunswick is very much the same as that of the Catskills, Adirondacks, or even Colorado, and patients who go to the south do not improve nearly as much as they do here in our stimulating, cold, crisp winter weather.

3rd. Dietetic—The forced feeding with milk and eggs is practically more essential than to take care of life, but of course patients could never take over 700 quarts of milk and 1,600 eggs yearly outside their regular meals, if it were for the stimulating effect of the out door life.

4th. Medicinal—There is a wide difference of opinion as to what is to be used advantageously.

5th. Sanatorium—The committee recommends the adoption of the pavilion house cottage, which is universally recognized as the best plan of hospital construction ever devised. Each patient is provided with separate sleeping apartment.

This ideal structure might be realized upon the following plan of expenditure:

Capacity of building, twenty-five patients.
1st. Cost of structure . . . \$20,000
2d. Furnishings . . . 5,000
3rd. Site of hospital . . . 2,000
The cost per patient would be \$9 to \$10 a week. This means that the yearly cost would be \$15,000, allowing for 25 patients.

In conclusion the committee ask for the appointment of a committee, consisting of men from all parts of the province, to select a suitable site. The report is signed by the following:

Treasurer's Report Presented at Annual Meeting Today Shows a Substantial Cash Balance on Hand.

The annual meeting of the board of management of the Home for Incurables takes place this afternoon at 4 p. m.

The treasurer, John V. Ellis, in his report says that the "W. W. Turnbull fund" remains the same as at the close of the fiscal year of 1902, namely \$96,431.15. The capital fund stands upon the books at \$96,766.15, made up as follows: Bonds, stocks and the premium thereon, \$83,782.84; mortgages on property in the city, \$9,300; cash on special deposit to credit of this fund, \$3,683.31; but of this \$335 belongs to current account, as was stated last year.
