## MAGISTRATE SAYS CRAWFORD ACTED VERY CRUELLY.

In the police court this morning two drunks were fined \$4 each. A peculiar thing about them was that they were both without stockings and were in their shoes with bare feet. They were sailors and don't wear stockings.

The court room was crowded with spectators interested in the case against Wm. White. The case was finished this morning. Magistrate Ritchie after receiving the evidence found the prisoner not guilty of resisting the police and that the policeman went beyond his powers in hitting the prisoner on the head. He allowed the prisoner to go on paying a fine of \$3 for being drunk.

In brief the magistrate said that he had received the evidence. The act with reference to such offenses as resisting the police is strong and plain. If the person arrested resists he is liable to a heavy penalty. If a person strikes an officer in the discharge of his duty he is liable to a fine four times stronger than it would be for striking a person who is not an officer.

### ATMOSPHERIC TEMPERATURE.

The temperature of the atmosphere cools on an average about 1 degree for every 300 feet that we ascend or warm at the same rate as we descend. The mean temperature at the north pole is 0 and at the equator between 80 and 90 degrees. We can, therefore, get into a temperature 1 degree colder for every seventy or eighty miles that we travel north and in a temperature 1 degree warmer for every seventy or eighty miles that we travel south.
