SUNDAY TRAGEDIES.

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 18.—Wong See Chung, the fourth victim of the Hop Sing Tong massacre, of rival tong in Boston's Chinatown three weeks ago, was buried today following unusually elaborate funeral services, attended by upwards of 3,000 Chinese and as many more white people. The services were held in the open street of the Oriental district, of the street. The deceased was a 33rd degree member of the Chinese Masonic order, and was buried in the presence of the river this afternoon by the capsize of the boat in which she, her sister, Clara Conings, of Boston and Hyman Sivovolovs were rowing. Miss Conings and Sivovolovs reached the shore but Mrs. Rosenthal never came to the surface after sinking.

PASCOAG, R. I., Aug. 18.—Ernest Petrol, for whom the police are searching in the belief that he is the murderer of Helen Brown, the eight year old girl who was found dead Friday, was still at large today. Three searching parties scoured the woods in the vicinity during the day, but without result. Deputy Sheriff Wood and his body of assistants took part in the search today, having given up watching the Brown house, to which place they thought he was likely to return.

SAN JUAN, Aug. 17.—An earthquake was noticed here at seven o'clock last night and at four o'clock this morning a heavy shock was felt. The shock awakened many people. No damage, however, had been reported from any part of Porto Rico.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 18.—John H. Hook and his two sons William and Henry, of Lancaster, Pa.,

were almost killed today in an automobile accident near Pleasantville. The machine was destroyed by fire after falling twenty feet over an embankment. Charles Young, who was driving the car has disappeared. It is said the chauffeur fell asleep and the machine jumped the embankment. All were thrown out. The father was internally hurt and the sons were bruised and cut.

CAPE MAY, N. J., Aug. 18.—By reason of an automobile skidding and running into a telegraph pole about three miles north of here, one of the occupants, Professor Howard T. Marteller, principal of Pleasantville, N. J., schools, was probably fatally injured. Four other persons in the machine escaped injury.

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 18.—W. V. McKeown, of Washington, Pa., and Miss Emma B. Quinn, of Bradford, were seriously hurt in an automobile accident at Sunnyside, near Kinderhook, Columbia county, early this evening. All parties are reticent but it is said that the steering gear of McKeown's car failed and the machine turned over while going swiftly down hill.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—Five cases of bubonic plague four of which have resulted in death have been reported to the health department within the last week, it transpired today. The patient, with one exception were of the poorer class of foreigners dwelling in the neighborhood of Chinatown. The exception was a foreign sailor. Prompt repressive measures were taken by the city and a spread of the disease is not feared. President Jules A. Sammon, of the city health board, and Officer Watkins today said the situation was well in hand and no occasion existed for alarm.

KING AND EMPEROR MAY DISCUSS MACEDONIA

Austrian Newspapers Attach Importance to
Meeting of Edward VII. and
Francis Joseph.

VIENNA, Aug. 17.—All the Austrian papers attribute great political importance to King Edward's visit to the Emperor Francis Joseph, which they base on the fact that Sir Charles Hardinge and Count von Aehrenthal accompany their sovereigns. Two years ago, when the King came alone, Count Goluchowski, the then foreign minister, who happened to be staying there with the Emperor, left for London two days before the King arrived to mark the purely personal character of the meeting.

The principal object of the present meeting is supposed to be the Macedonian question. The Zeit states on high authority that King Edward's visit to Ischl comes quite unexpected. The Emperor Francis Joseph had informed the King that he would pay him a visit at or near Meran to thank the King for his visit to Ischl two years ago, but quite recently the Emperor received word that King Edward that he would call at Ischl.

An exchange of telegrams between both sovereigns followed, and, as a consequence, Count von Aehrenthal, foreign minister, has been ordered to be at Ischl. The Balkan question, regarding which a perfect understanding has been arrived at at the recent meeting between Signor Tittoni and Count Aehrenthal, will be the principal subject of the meeting of the sovereigns, and England, says the Zeit, is ready to adhere to that understanding.

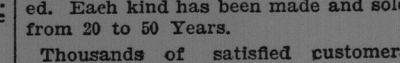
