"The Town's Incorporation Act"

Any person thinking himself aggrieved by any assessment made under this chapter, or the agent of any non-resident, may appeal by a petition under oath, made before a justice to the council at any time within thirty days after the date of the notice of assessment served on him, or left at his last known place of residence, and the council shall have power to grant such relief as seems just, and no appeal shall be made against such assessment by certiorari, or otherwise, until the matter has been first brought before the town council as herein provided."
