Churches of New Cardinal

Rome, Feb. 29.—Pope Plus, in conferring the title of protector of an ancient Roman church upon each of the American cardinals, has assigned them to churches particularly famous.

The custom of naming cardinal protectors dates from the early days when all the cardinals lived in Rome. There are 72 ancient churches, corresponding with the number of seats

in the college of cardinals. The cardinal protector was expected to spend large sums in rebuilding and beautifying his church, to officiate at the more solemn ceremonies there and to confer upon it all the dignity possible. Upon his death he left his red hat in the church.

Cardinal O'Connell was assigned to the protectorate of the church of San Galiato, famous for its catacombs, in which 170,000 early Christians were buried.

To Cardinal Farley was given the title of the church of Santa Maria in Sopra Minerva, famous as the only

Gothic edifice of the 400 churches in Rome. It contains the tombs of St. Catherine and Fra Angelico, Michael Angelo's statue of Christ and famous pictures.

Cardinal Gibbons was the protector of the church of Santa Maria in Trastevere, the first temple publicly used for Christian worship in Rome, and dating from 222 A. D.

Two ancient Roman churches which used to enjoy the honor of a cardinal protector, have been without it for 40 years, since the new kingdom of Italy took Rome from the popes. These are the Pantheon, built by Appian, and later converted into a Catholic church, and now appropriated as a burial place for the royal family and the church of Santa Maria degli Angeli, famous as a work of Michael Angelo. The latter is a part of the ruins of the baths of Diocletian and was taken over by the state along with the ruins.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agent's Office. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or on a portion of it for a period of six years from the date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate 50 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$16.00 acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of the three years. Fifty acres extra and erect a house worth \$300.00.
