The head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency in Saint John, N. B., or at any other Dominion Lands Agency (not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.
