

COLPITTS REUNION AT COLPITTS

Large Gathering of Descendants of First Colpitts Family—To Meet in Five Years

Moncton, Aug. 25.—Colpitts settlement, Albert county, today was the scene of the Colpitts family reunion, an event which takes place every five years, and at which there is always a large gathering of the descendants of the first Colpitts family. Mr. and Mrs. Colpitts, who came from New Brunswick, landed in Moncton in 1783 to settle in New Brunswick. The reunion today was held on the farm of Louis Colpitts, the old Colpitts homestead and headquarters were present. A feature of the gathering was the reading by the secretary, Rev. R. J. Colpitts, St. John of the roll of honor, those of the Colpitts family to serve in the great world war. The list of war heroes was a long one and it was decided to erect on the old Colpitts homestead a monument to the memory of those who died on the European battlefields. The retiring president of the Colpitts family reunion is F. W. S. Colpitts, merchant of Moncton. The new officers elected today are as follows: President, Fred Colpitts, Colpitts Settlement; Secretary, Rev. R. J. Colpitts, St. John. Additional members of executive, Charles W. Colpitts, Colpitts Settlement; F. W. S. Colpitts, Moncton; Allan Colpitts, Moncton; E. L. Colpitts, Pictou; Herbert M. Colpitts, Woodstock; N. B.: Otto Beakney, Elin; R. M. Day, McDonald's Point; Ray Hornerman, Pictou.

It was decided to hold another reunion in five years time, and at that gathering the monument to the war heroes, who gave their lives in defence of the Empire, will be unveiled. A programme of sports was carried out during the afternoon. Today's reunion was the sixth held.

GOVERNMENTAL LINE PROVES SUCCESS

London, Aug. 25.—(By Canadian Associated Press.)—The senior trade commissioner for Australia, in his annual report, dwells upon the great success that attended the running of the Governmental Line of steamers by the Government of Australia, as freights charged being less than those of the shipping companies. Six Government ships are in commission out of a shipbuilding programme of twenty. Their cost compares favourably with those built in the United Kingdom and elsewhere. The Commissioner further remarks that many Australians express the conviction that British manufacturers are intensely conservative and unenterprising, and points out that the commercial community in overseas centres is often small and that every fault and foolishness perpetrated by the home manufacturer is magnified out of proportion to its real significance.

DEMONSTRATION AT BRIXTON PRISON

London, Aug. 25.—A meeting which was attended by thousands, was held tonight in the vicinity of Brixton jail in protest against the treatment of Lord Mayor MacSwiney of Cork. Speeches were made by Sinn Feiners and Laborites. At the close of the meeting a section of the crowd, with Sinn Fein flags at their head, marched down Brixton Hill, where they engaged in a free fight with the police, at whom stones were thrown. One policeman was knocked insensible and another also was injured. The crowd was dispersed by a charge of mounded police with drawn batons. Several arrests were made.
