ON BUELOW HANDLES PO QUESTION IN REICHSTAG.

Displays Skill in Dealing With Religious Controversies—No More of Polish Children During Religious Instruction.

Berlin, Jan. 13.—Count von Buelow is regarded as having handled the vexed Polish question, complicated as it is with religious controversies, with much skill. His announcement that the government would desist from the corporal punishment of Polish children during religious instruction is accepted as eliminating the principal weapon with which the agitators incite the passions of the Poles.

Public expectation has been created in today's interpellations in the lower house of the diet as likely to provoke much feeling among the opponents of the government.

TALK BORDER QUARANTINE.

Smallpox Outbreak in the Adirondacks and at Big Moose and Saranac Lake.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 13.—There is an epidemic of smallpox in the lumber camps of the Adirondacks. More than twenty cases have been reported to the state department of health from the upper lake.

LONDON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

Canadian Trade Section Passes Resolution on Hon. Mr. Dobbell's Death—Insolvency Legislation—Lloyd's Discrimination.

Montreal, Jan. 13.—(Special)—The Star's special cable from London says: "At today's meeting of the London Chamber of Commerce, of which the late Mr. Dobbell was president, a resolution of deep sympathy with Mrs. Dobbell and family in their great loss, was unanimously adopted."

SMALLPOX CASE IN MONCTON.

Harry Moore Reported Very Ill—Quarantine Established.

Moncton, Jan. 13.—(Special)—Harry Moore, clerk in the I. C. R. mechanical office has been definitely pronounced to be suffering from smallpox. Moore resided at Mrs. McQuarrie's, corner Fleet and Highfield street, and took meals at Mrs. Gross' boarding house, Fleet street, and both houses have been quarantined.

A BLOW AT THE DOWIETES.

Elder Sentenced to Jail for Three Months in British Columbia.

Vancouver, Jan. 13.—(Special)—The full court of British Columbia has affirmed the judgment of Justice Drake sentencing Elder Brooks, Christian Catholic church in Zion, to three months' imprisonment for counselling one of his adherents not to engage a doctor when his children were suffering from diptheria. This will likely have the effect of driving the Dowietes out of the province.

DID NOT FAVOR ROSEBERY.

MEETING OF LONDON LIBERAL ASSOCIATION DESCRIBED AS HOSTILE.

London, Jan. 13.—The inaugural meeting of the London Liberal Association at St. James' hall tonight had been awaited with great interest, primarily because it was pronounced that night would be tarred upon the reputation between Lord Rosebery and the Liberal party.

St. James' hall was crowded and thousands of people were turned away from the doors. Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman and Earl Spencer were greeted vociferously. Mrs. Hobhouse, who was the first person to agitate regarding the condition of the concentration camps in South Africa, was called to the platform and received an ovation.

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MAIL STEAMER AT HALIFAX.

FIRST VISIT OF THE PRETORIAN, AN ABLE LOOKING SHIP.

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 13.—(Special)—Stim. Pretorian, one of the latest additions to the Allan fleet, and of similar class to the Ionian and Bavarian, passed her first visit to this port this evening, arriving at quarantine at 6 o'clock and reaching her wharf about 7. She came from Glasgow via Mobile and brought mails and passengers. Previous to coming here she was running to New York. She left Mobile on the 4th. Passengers state that the trip was an exceedingly rough one.

Following were her daily runs: Saturday, Jan. 4, 185 miles; Sunday, 183; Monday, 207; Tuesday, 168; Wednesday, 232; Thursday, 169; Friday, 222; Saturday, 114; Sunday, 313; Monday to noon, 360 miles and from noon to port, 93 miles; total distance covered being 2,338 miles.

AGED WOMAN FOUND DEAD.

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA IS CALLED TO MEET FEBRUARY 13.

Ottawa, Jan. 13.—(Special)—At a meeting of the cabinet today it was decided to summon parliament to meet on February 13. This is exactly one week later than last year. An extra of the Canada Gazette will be issued at once with the usual proclamation calling parliament for the dispatch of business on the date mentioned. It is expected that the session will be a short one as no legislation of a contentious character is likely to be introduced.

APPLES TO GREAT BRITAIN.

Shipments from Halifax Greater Than from Portland, Boston or New York.

Boston, Jan. 13.—The week past was a busy one for apple shippers at this port for the Liverpool steamers carried away 4,150 barrels, the greatest number shipped from any Atlantic port except Portland, which sent out 7,730. This was a decided increase over the export of the port in the week ending January 4, which was but 1,885, and then the figure was in excess of the other United States ports.

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
