





New York, Aug. 31.—Charles M. Schwab and Henry C. Fr.ck appeared in town yes-terday. Mr. Schwab leane from Loretta (Penn.), while Mr. Frick arrived from Europe. The eyes of the business world are on these two men at present, because they may bay a very important part in the great steel war which has been predicted. They are traditional enemies in a business way. Mr. Frick was unfriendly to the Schwab administration in U. S. steel and is supposed to have been the principal factor in the fight which finally ousted Schwab. The latter is to be the head of the great Bedhlehem steel company reorganized. It is said that his ambition is to make the new company a dangerous competitor of the U. S. steel cor-poration. Mr. Schwab knows the steel business in Archbishop Bond, Sir George Drummond, Mayor Laporte. ex-Mayor Wilson-Smith,
